CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

ARTICLE II—PURPOSE

The purpose of this organization is to create, maintain, and extend throughout the school and community high standards of Christian character *through* the Four "C's," namely

1. Clean Living.
2. Clean Speech.
3. Clean Scholarship.
4. Clean Sportsmanship.

And by bringing boys into personal relationship with Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord, by seeking their growth in faith and conduct, by leading them into loyal membership and service to the Hi-Y Club.

ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

Sec. 1. Any young man student of the three upper classes in the high school who subscribes to the stated purpose of this organization and is accepted by the Executive Committee at one of its regular meetings is eligible to membership.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

Sec. 1. The officers of this club shall consist of President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer.

Sec. 2. The officers of the executive committee shall be as follows: the President of the club as chairman of the committee and the Secretary of the club as secretary of the committee.

Sec. 3. Vacancies occurring between elections shall be filled by nomination from the floor and election in the regular manner.

ARTICLE V

Sec. 1. Regular meetings shall be held on the 1st and 3rd Wednesday night of each month of the school year.

ARTICLE VI—AMENDMENTS

This constitution and ensuing By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of those voting, provided the proposed amendment has been submitted in writing at a previous regular meeting.

Proposed amendments to this constitution the ensuing By-Laws must first be submitted to the Executive Committee and approved by them before the club can take any action on the same.

ARTICLE VII

This constitution and the ensuing By-Laws shall become effective upon the approval of three-fourths ($\frac{3}{4}$) of those voting who are eligible to vote.

BY-LAWS

I—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Sec. 1. The president shall preside at all meetings of the club and at all Executive Committee meetings.

Sec. 2. The Vice-president shall be chairman of the program committee.

Sec. 3. The secretary shall take the minutes of all meetings of the club and of the meetings of the Executive Committee, which shall be an accurate record of the business transacted, and perform such duties as pertain to the office. The Secretary shall also keep an accurate record of the attendance of the members.

ZENITH

Sec. 4. The treasurer shall receive all moneys of the club, keep an accurate record of receipts and expenditures and shall pay out money only as voted by the club with the consent of the Executive Committee, through the school treasurer.

II—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Sec. 1. The Executive Committee shall be made up as follows: the superintendent, the principal of the high schools, the faculty advisor of the club, the president of the Hi-Y club, the secretary of the Hi-Y club and two members of the club elected by the club at its regular election of officers for the club.

Sec. 2. The responsibilities of the Executive Committee shall be the general supervision of all the activities and finances of this organization and the preparing and forwarding of an annual report to the State or National Headquarters of the movement. They shall leave immediate initiative and execution of *all work* to the members.

III—ELECTIONS

Sec. 1. The election of officers of this club shall be as follows: At the first three (3) members to prepare a complete slate of officers for the club. This committee regular meeting in December the president shall appoint a nominating committee of to report at the next regular meeting. At such time the club may make additional nominations from the floor. At the close of such nominations they shall proceed immediately to elect by ballot the officers of the club. Installation of these officers to take place at the regular meeting following the election, in accordance with the Hi-Y ritual.

Sec. 2. The officers of this club shall be elected by a majority ballot, members voting secretly.

Sec. 3. The Executive Committee shall prepare an approved list of candidates from the boys of the three (3) upper classes and submit the same to the club, for election of new members, at the first regular meeting in October. The first vote shall be taken upon the list as presented. If the list receives an affirmative two-thirds ($\frac{2}{3}$) vote, then all candidates shall be declared elected. If the list does not receive the necessary two-thirds ($\frac{2}{3}$) affirmative vote, then the voting shall be on each candidate's name separately. A two-thirds ($\frac{2}{3}$) affirmative vote is necessary to elect. Election to membership at any time other than herein stated must meet the approval of both the club and Executive Committee. Application for membership must be made in writing on the official application form.

IV—DUES

Dues shall be 50¢ per semester payable not later than one month after the first regular meeting date of each semester. In the case of new members, one semester's dues must accompany the application.

V—MEMBERSHIP

Sec. 1. Failure to comply with article IV of these By-Laws will cause said members name to be given to the Executive Committee for final decision as to his membership. Until the Executive Committee has taken action said member will be ineligible to participate in any activities of the club.

Sec. 2. Absence from three consecutive regular meetings will necessitate the appearance of said member before the Executive Committee to give reasons for his absence. Failure to appear before the Executive Committee shall result in his automatic suspension.

Sec. 3. Failure to comply with the purpose of the organization (as set forth in Article two (2) of the constitution) shall constitute sufficient grounds for expulsion from the club.

Sec. 4. Final decision in all cases of suspension or expulsion shall rest with the Executive Committee.

VI—QUORUM

The quorum shall be nine members of the club in good standing meeting with the faculty advisor or in case of his absence meeting with the superintendent or principal of the high school.

VII—PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The parliamentary authority of this club shall be, "Robert's Rules of Order."

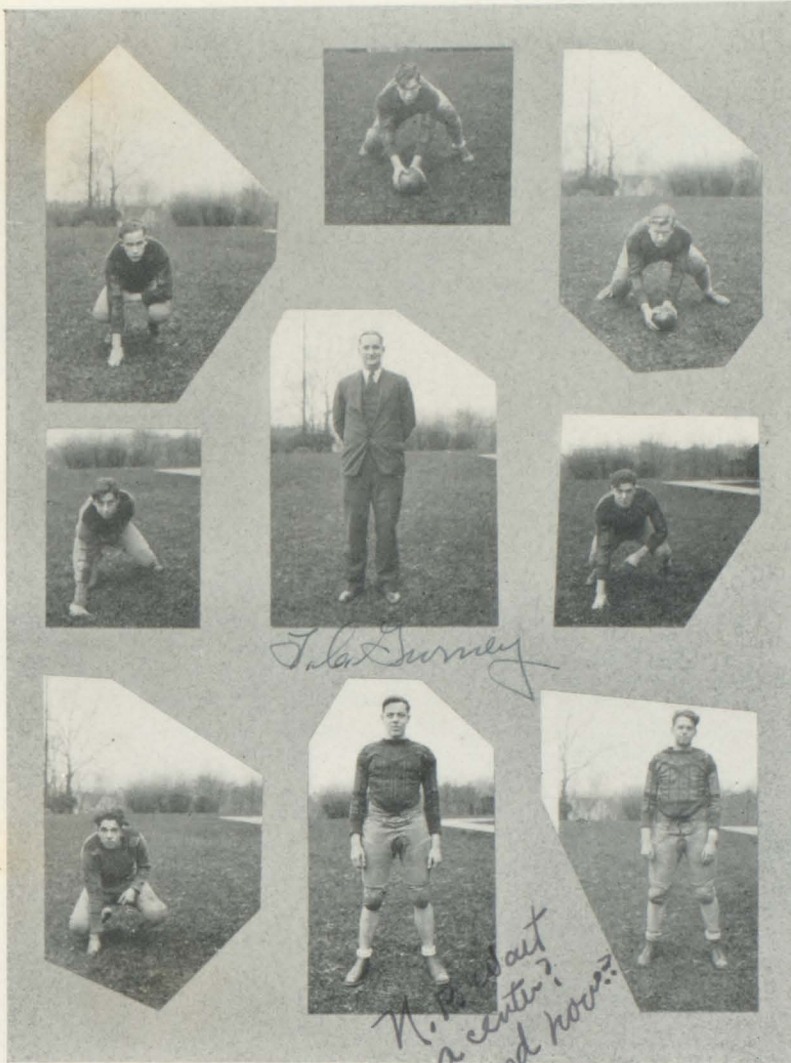
