The championship basketball team of 1935 counts among its stars four of our members. Also many seniors were on the football and track teams.

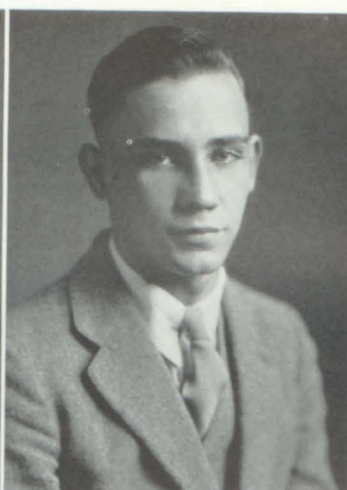

EIGHTH GRADE

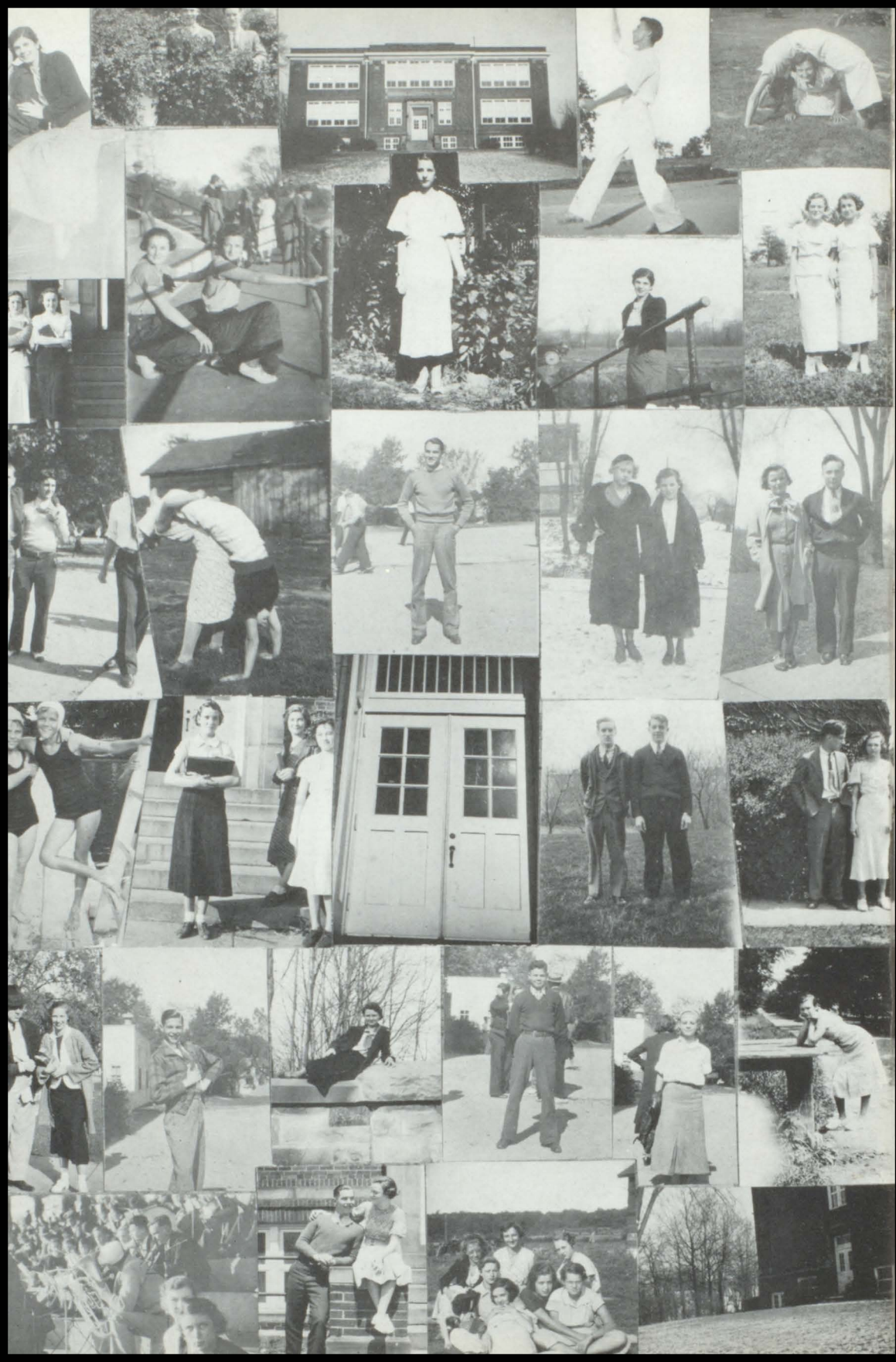

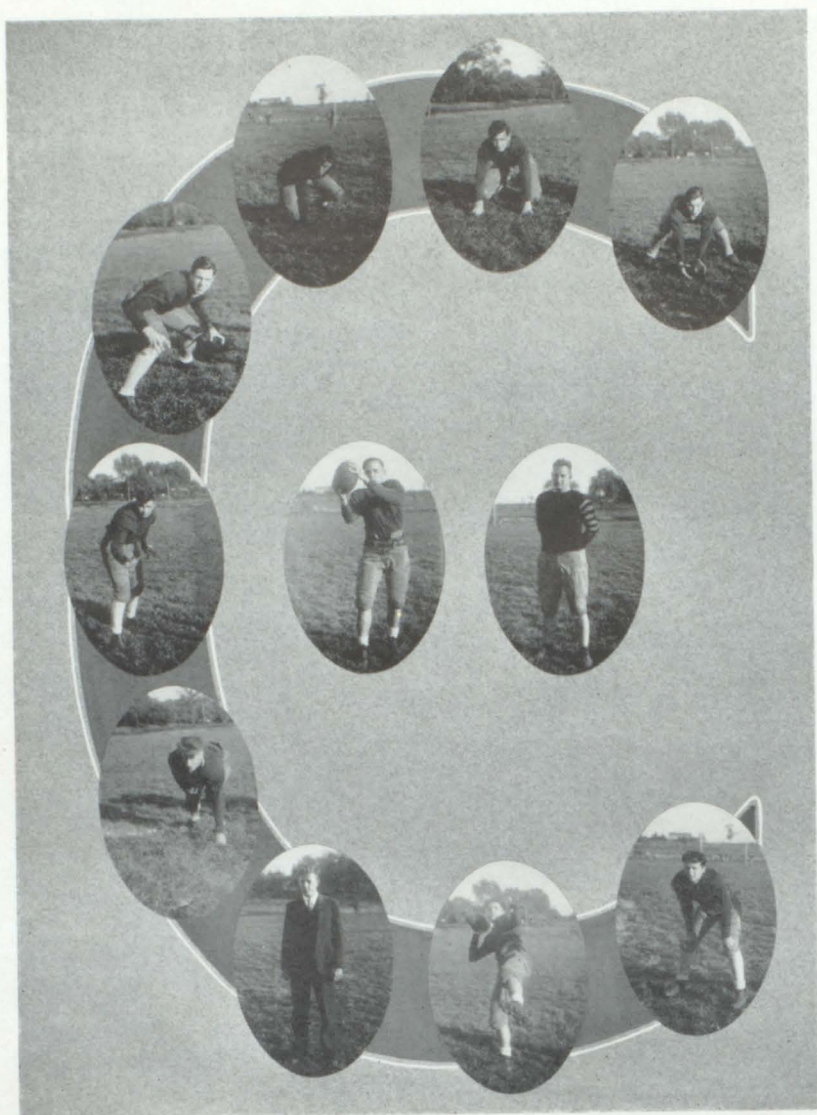
The seventh graders are the newest addition to our student body. Although they have not yet become completely adjusted to high school life, they have shown much promise and should develop into a superior group.

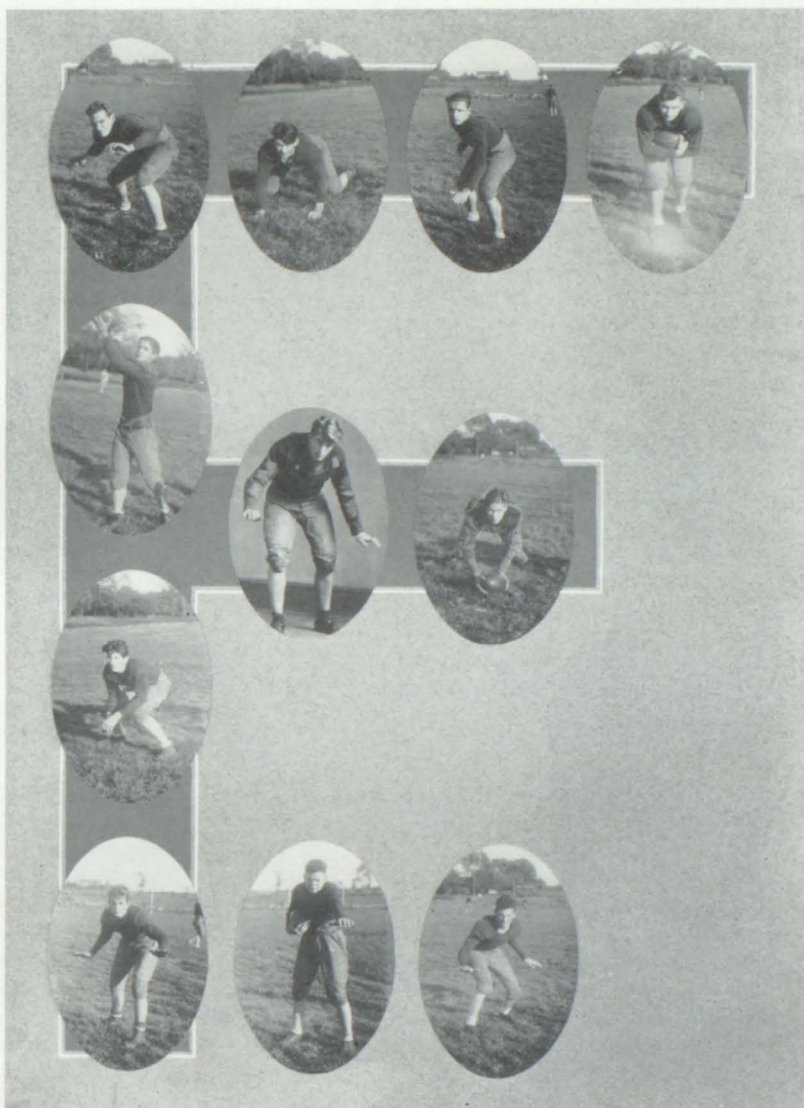

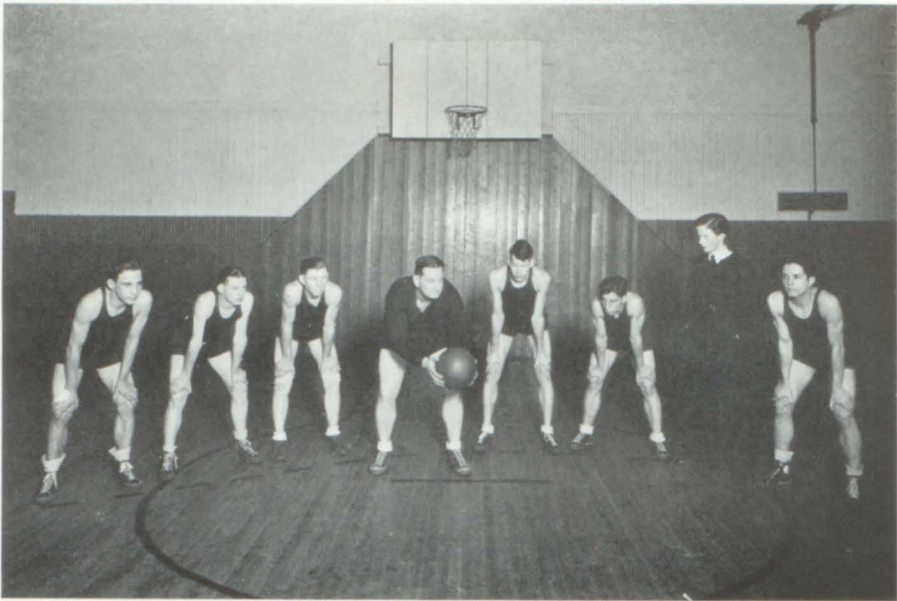

GEORGE OBER—*Center*

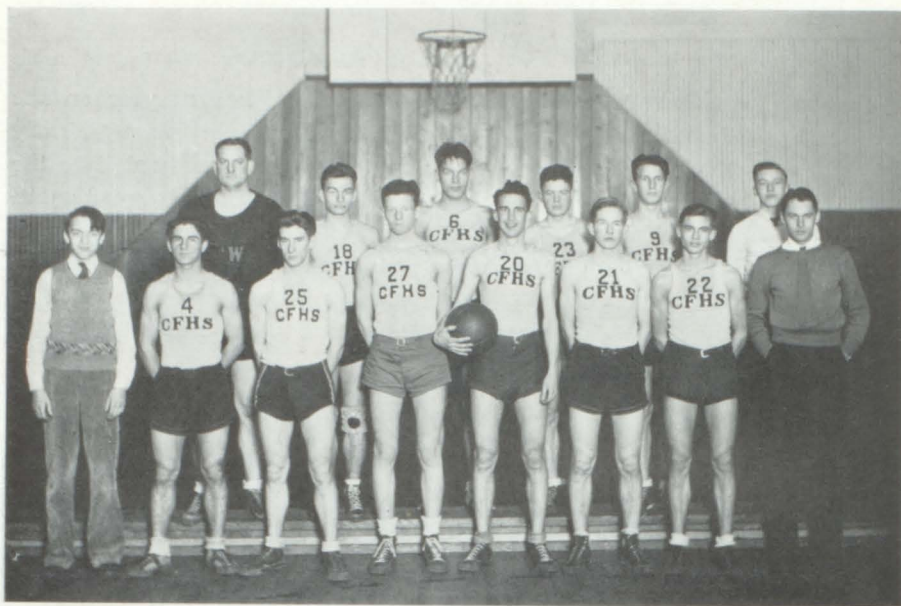

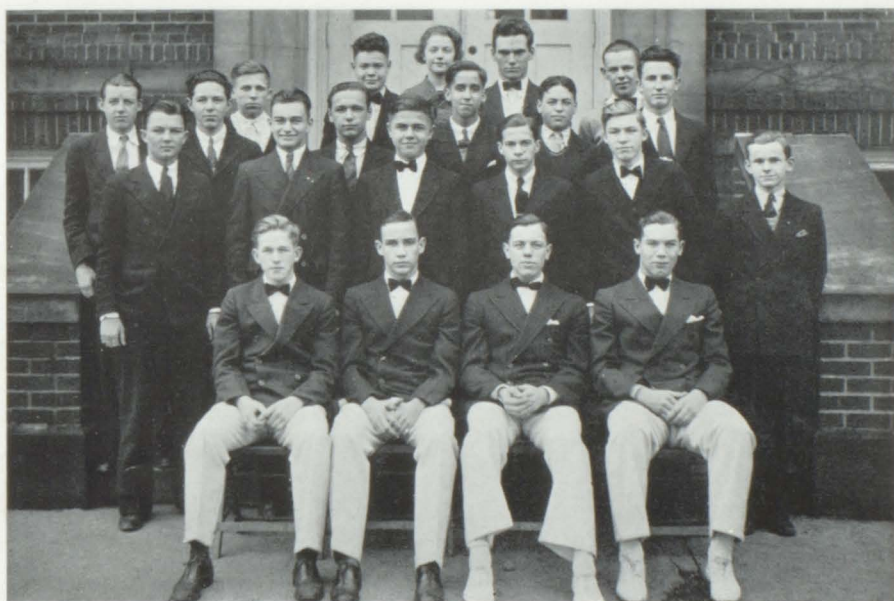
BOYS' GLEE

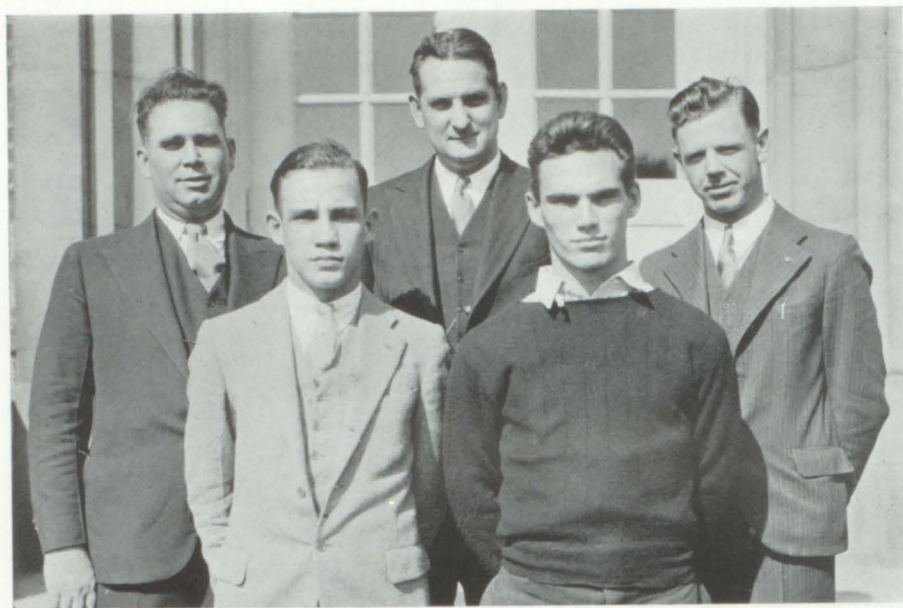
ECHO STAFF

The Girl Reserve Club of Chagrin Falls was organized in 1922 by Miss Hanna and this year was launched on its twelfth year of existence.

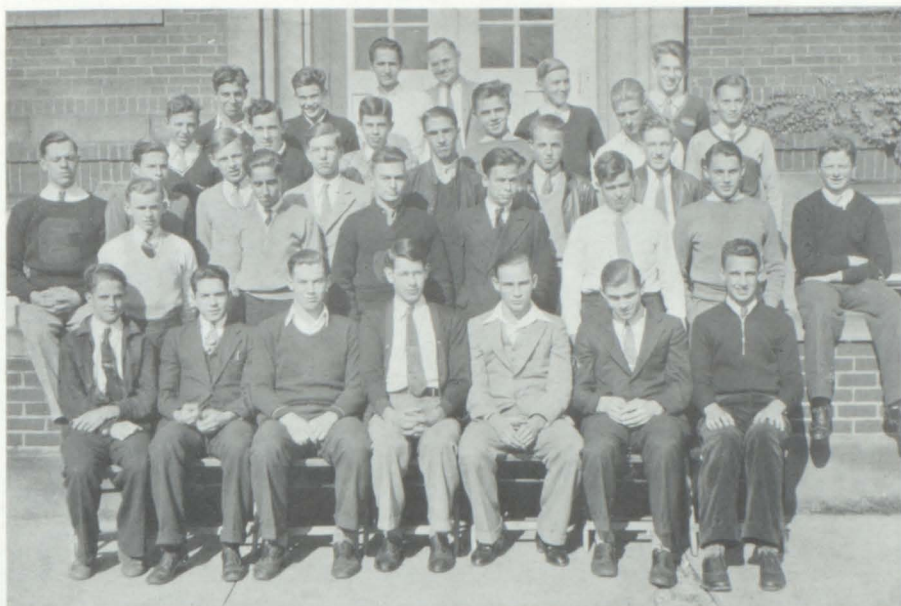

Many new members were initiated into the good times of the club by going on an overnight hike last June. The club went to Mr. Riddle's farm on the upper Chagrin River.

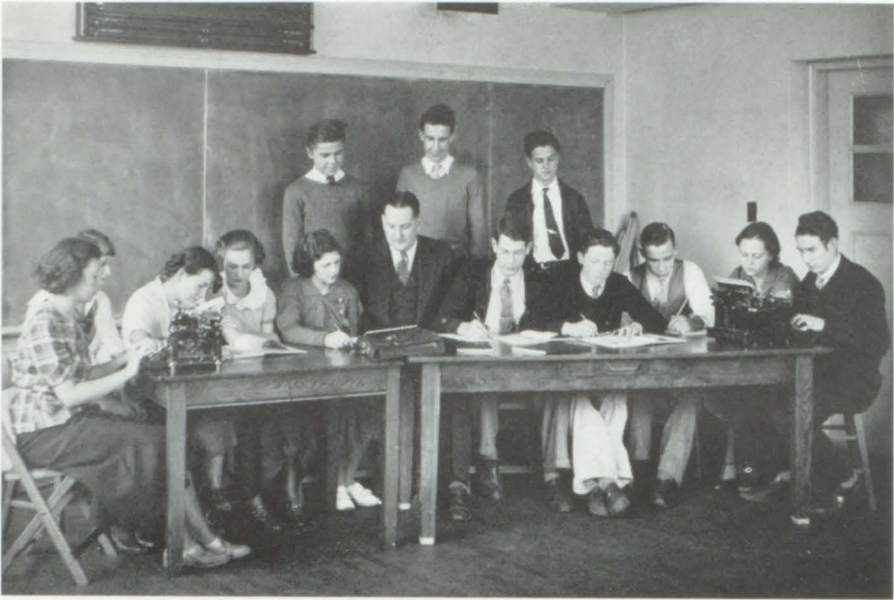
During the middle of the year the members received their new pins, which consisted of a triangular pin with the Hi-Y emblem on it, and a chain and guard connected to it.

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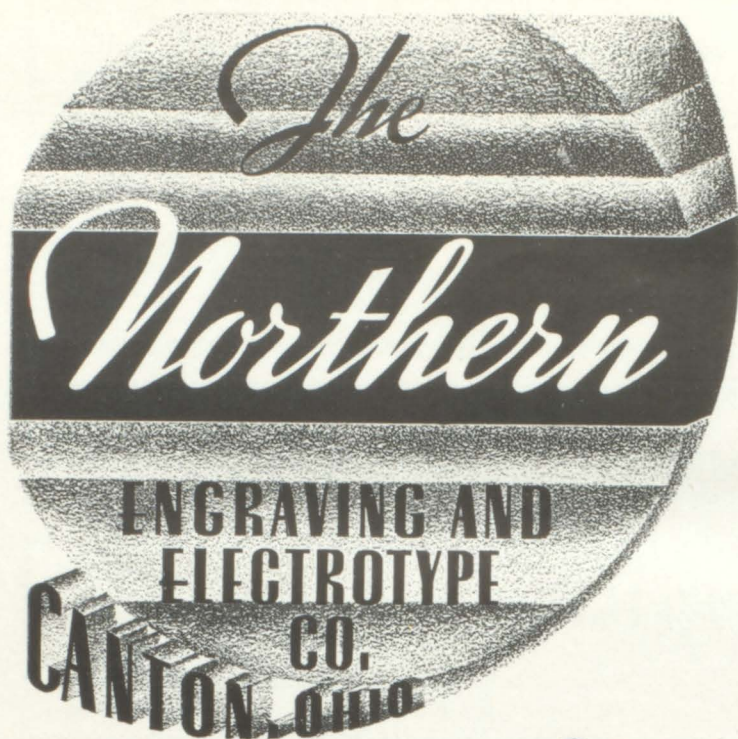
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
