FOREWORD

Pleasant thoughts of true fellowships with school friends and faculty, now vivid and seemingly indelible, will gradually fade and pass.

To preserve these memories for future moments of enjoyment is the object of this book.

In my years at Chagrin Falls this is my ninth attempt to write a foreword for your year-book. If, then, I seem to repeat myself, I can only say that some things need to be said again and again.

In planning for the future we must be aware of what has taken place in the past. During the years of World War II, we were painfully conscious of our duties, our rights, and our heritage. I would like to recall an excerpt from each of my forewords for the War Years.

1942 - "Since the declaration of War on December 8, 1951, Americans are learning that their most cherished possessions are not material things -- but the mind and spirit."

1943 - "Future historians will record the fact that 1943 was a year in which Americans gave up their money, their luxurious comforts, and their lives in the defense of the democratic way of life."

1944 - "The greatest asset of our nation is not in the treasury, nor is it listed on the books of our Treasury Department. It lies in the ideas, attitudes, and philosophies of the American youth. Upon those factors depends the outcome of all efforts, both public and private. The work of the public school as an agency for training oncoming generations of citizens is of concern to everybody. Indeed, everybody has a part in it; everybody is a part of it."

1945 - "We can look to the future with confidence. The nation is sound at heart. Irrespective of where you were born, you and I and all good citizens of these United States are Americans above all else. Race, class or sectional consciousness does not belong in a real American's heart." -- Thomas A. Edison.

1946 - "The Atom bomb brought World War II to a sudden and dramatic close. It also precipitated mankind into a new era - The Atomic Age. Can man survive his new scientific discovery? Will he be able to harness this Atomic power for constructive purposes, or will he use it as a weapon of self-destruction -- thus ending all civilization."

And now for the current year of 1957-1958 -- the year of sharp rises and declines of the stock market, of investigations, accusations and predicted resignations in Washington; the year of competition in space satellites and atomic missiles - a year in which many changes are certain to be made. Yet, in America, numerous young people from our high schools and colleges step forward from the rank and file to solve these problems. They are willing to perform beyond the call of duty until the situation is righted.

I would covet, for each member of the 1958 Graduation Class, the opportunity to prepare themselves to the full extent of their capabilities. Then they will perform their life's work with complete confidence whether it be the call of their Country or their God.

BILL CORDES






