

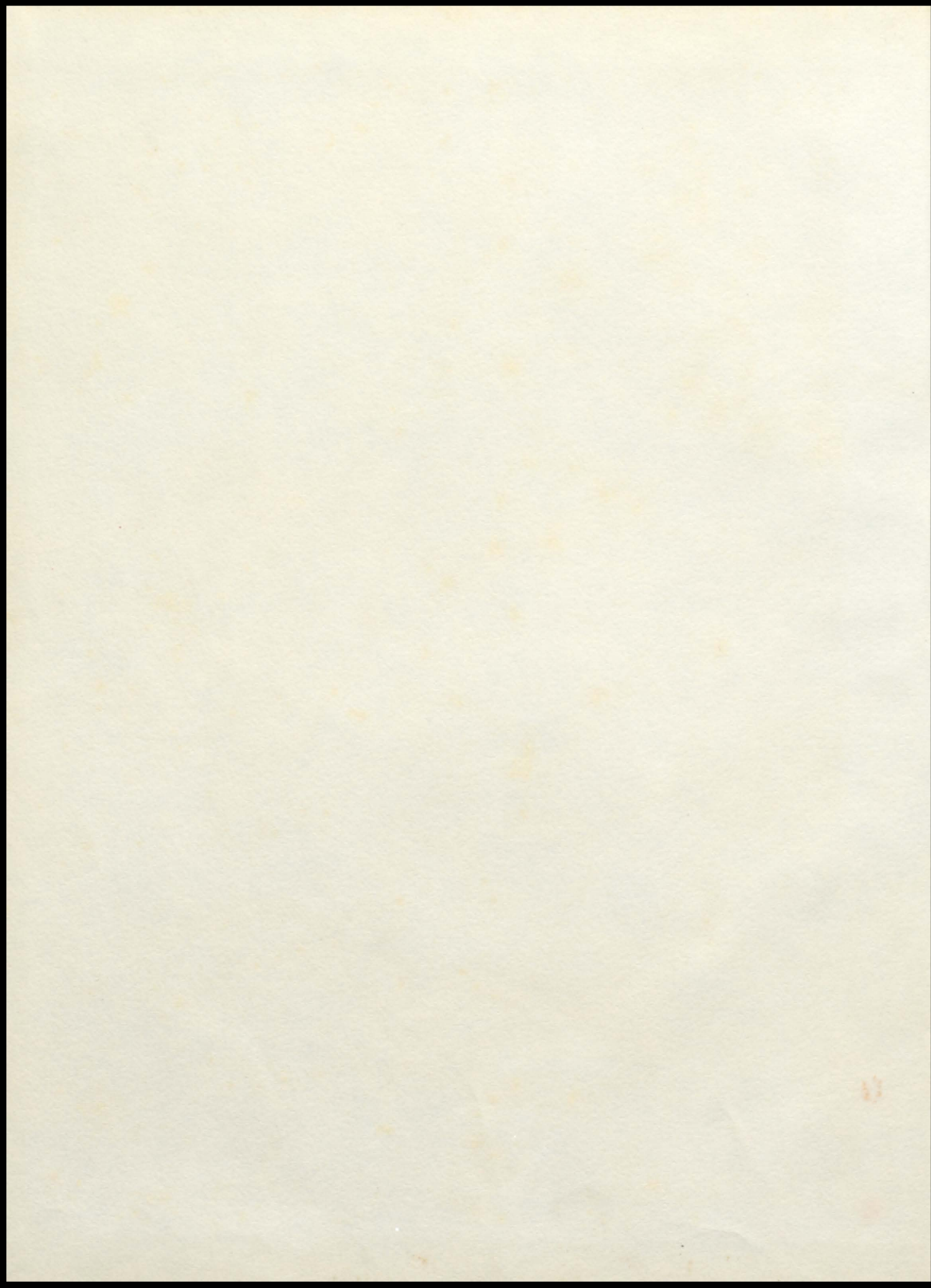

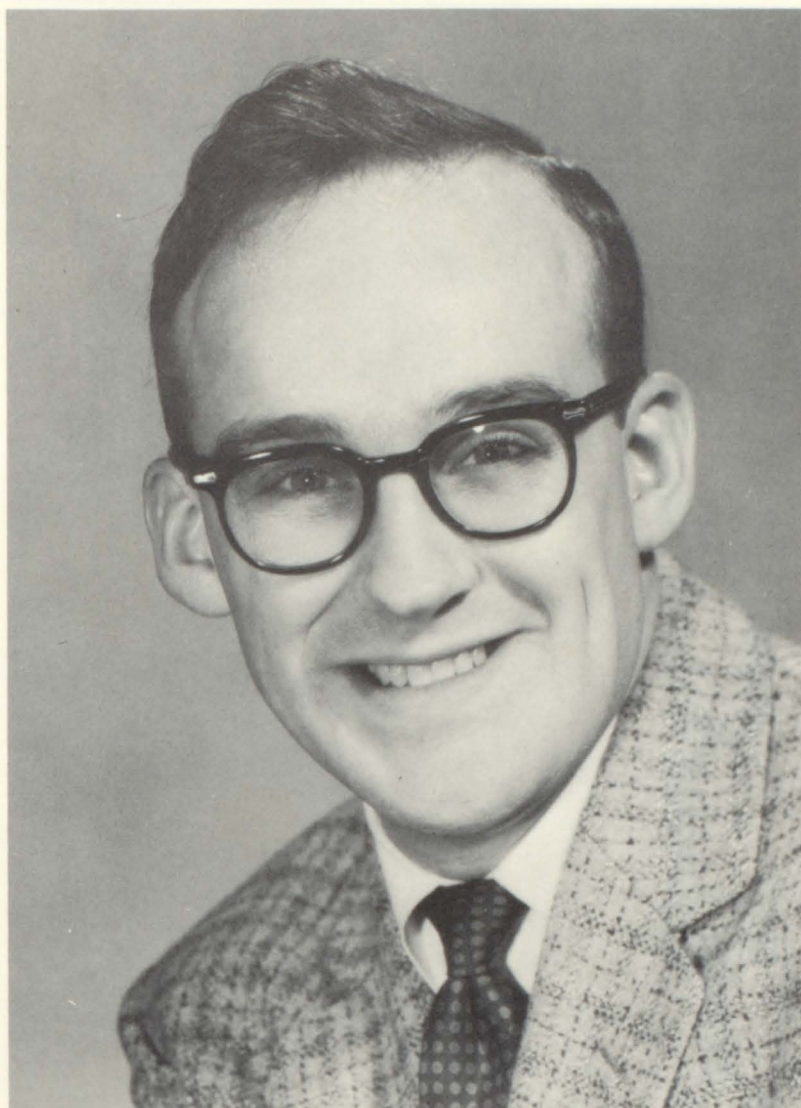
The age of technology confronts you with a vast number of occupations and endeavors for which your high school education will serve only as a foundation.
