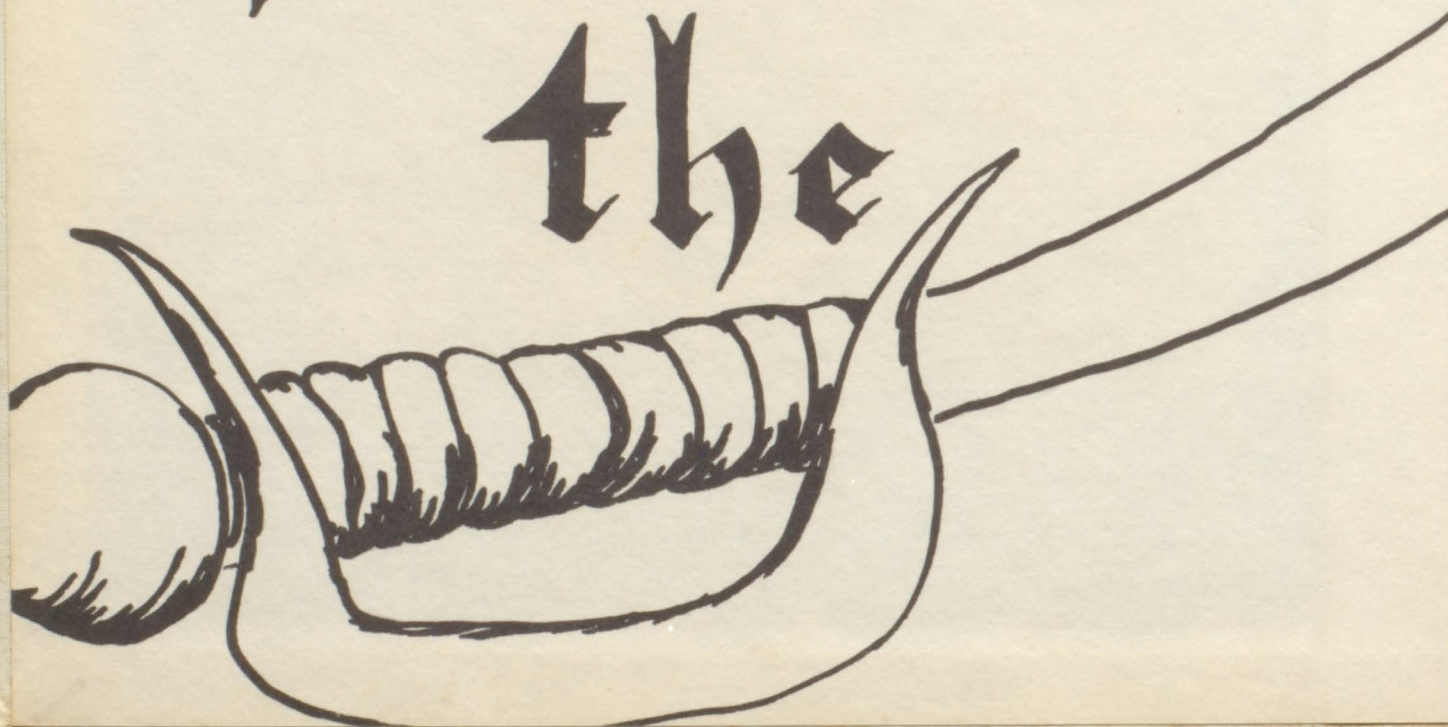




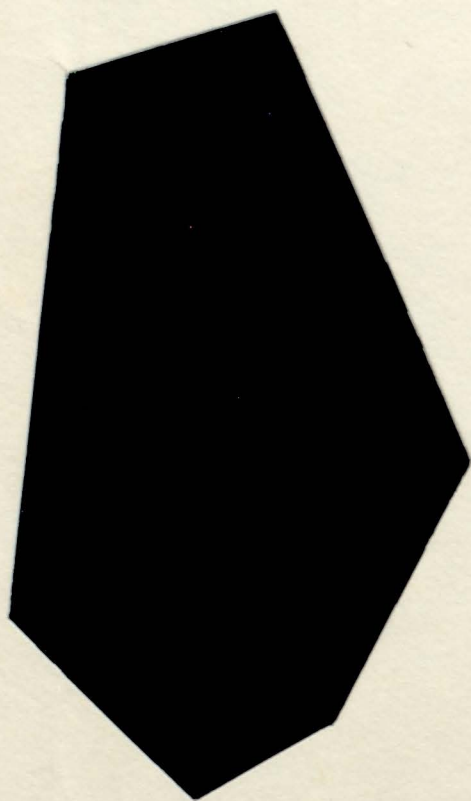

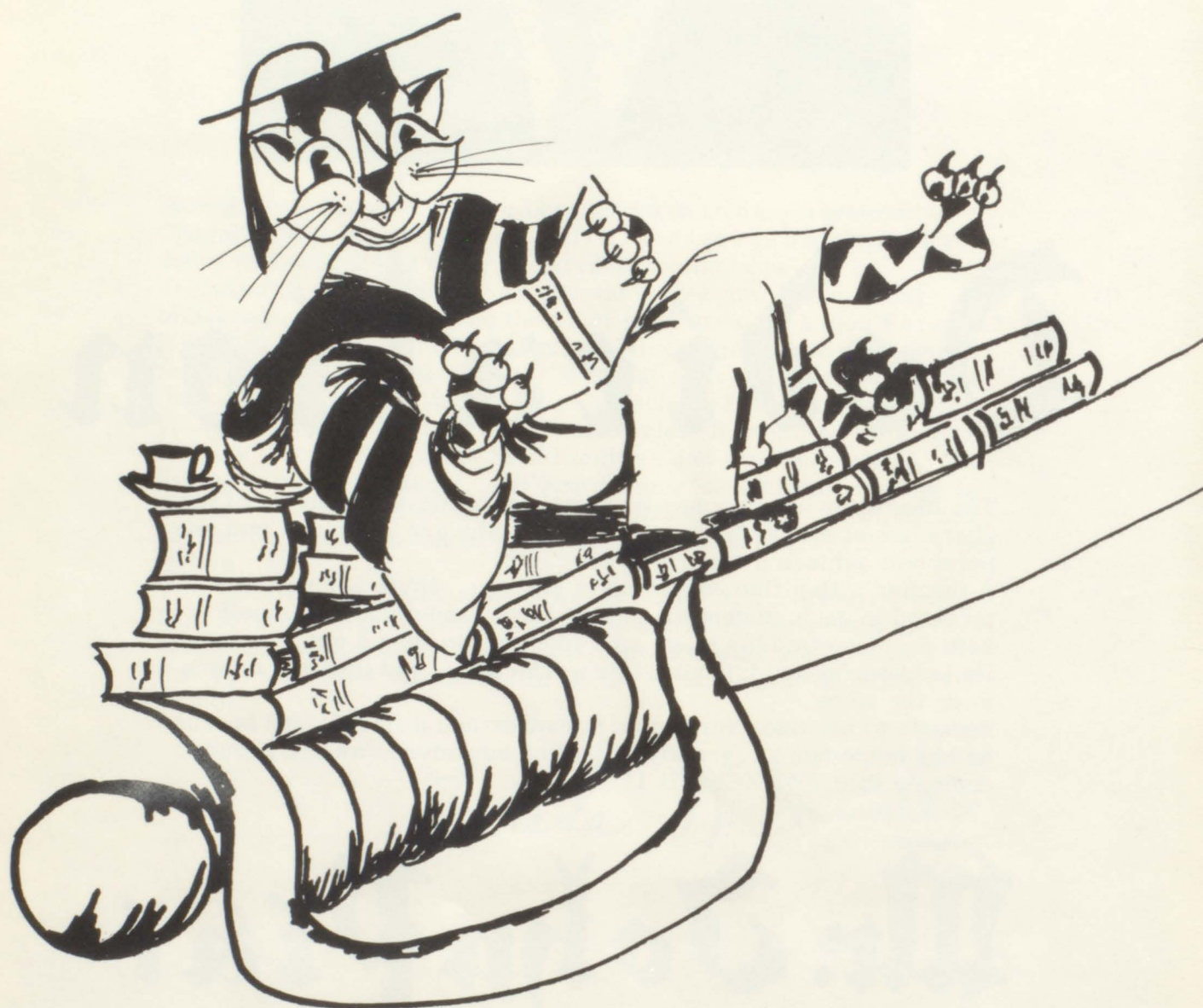
The character of a teacher frequently aids the development of the character of his students. Many attributes are combined into one person to achieve a composite character.

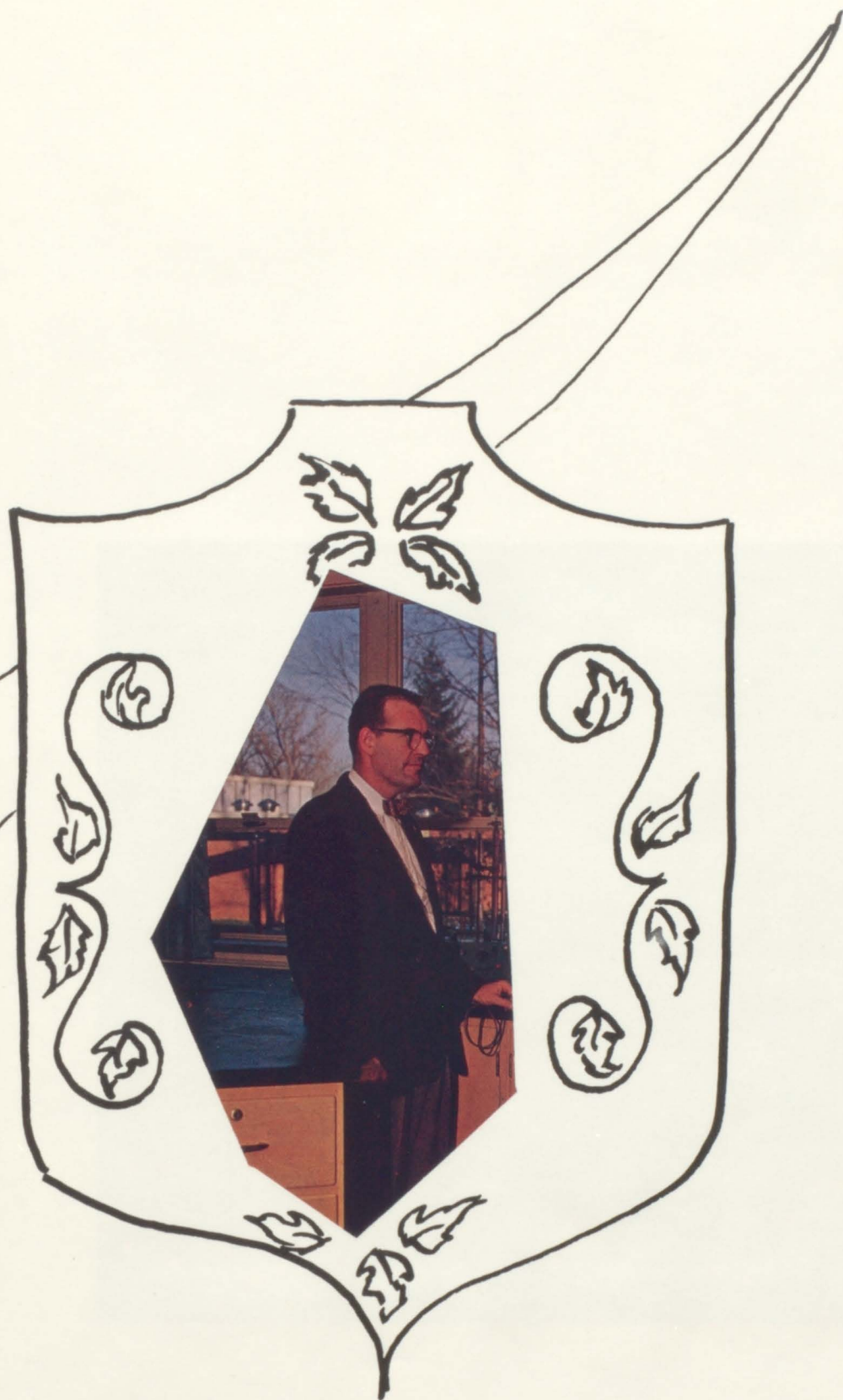
