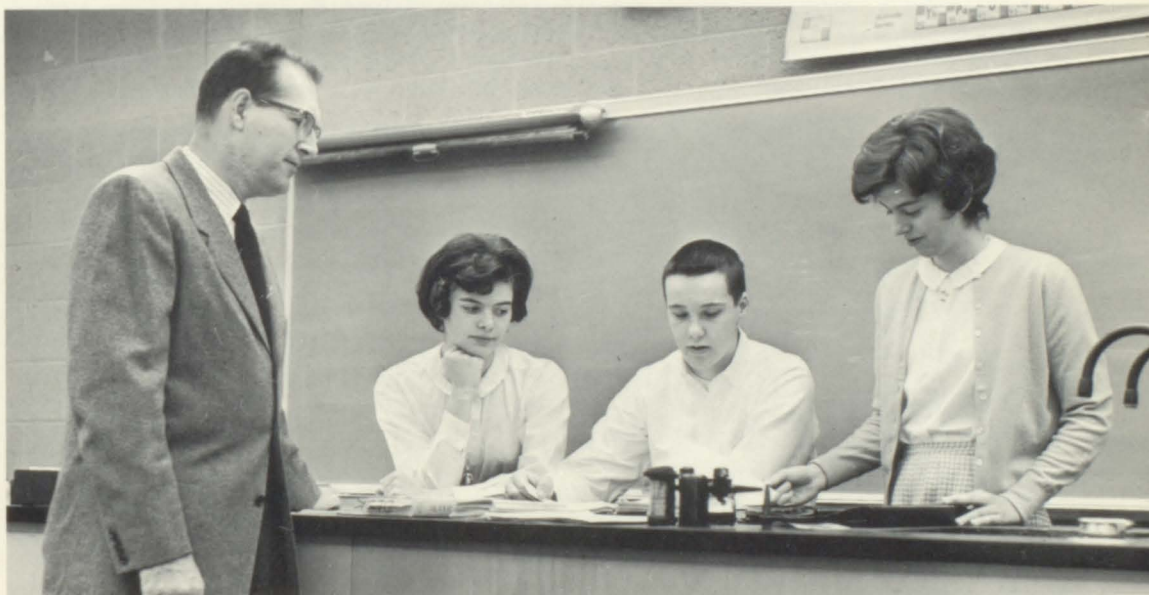
NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

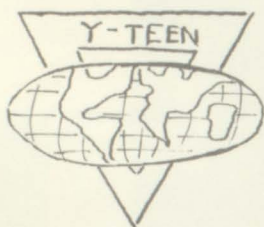

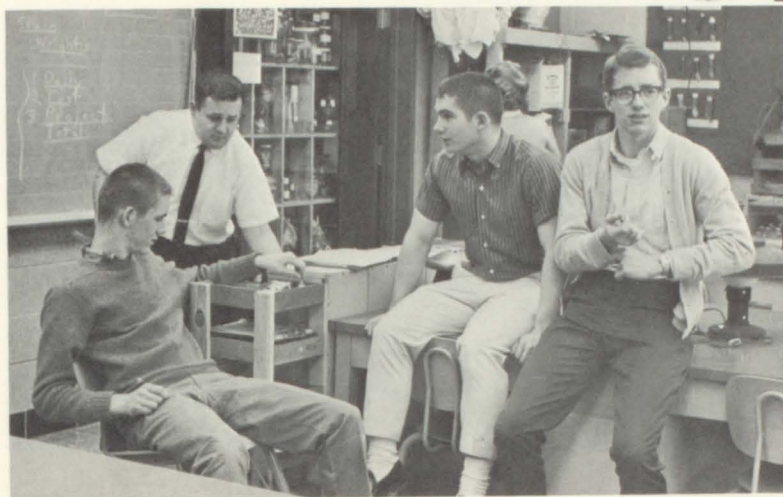


KEY CLUB

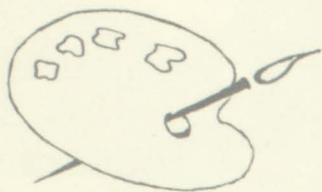

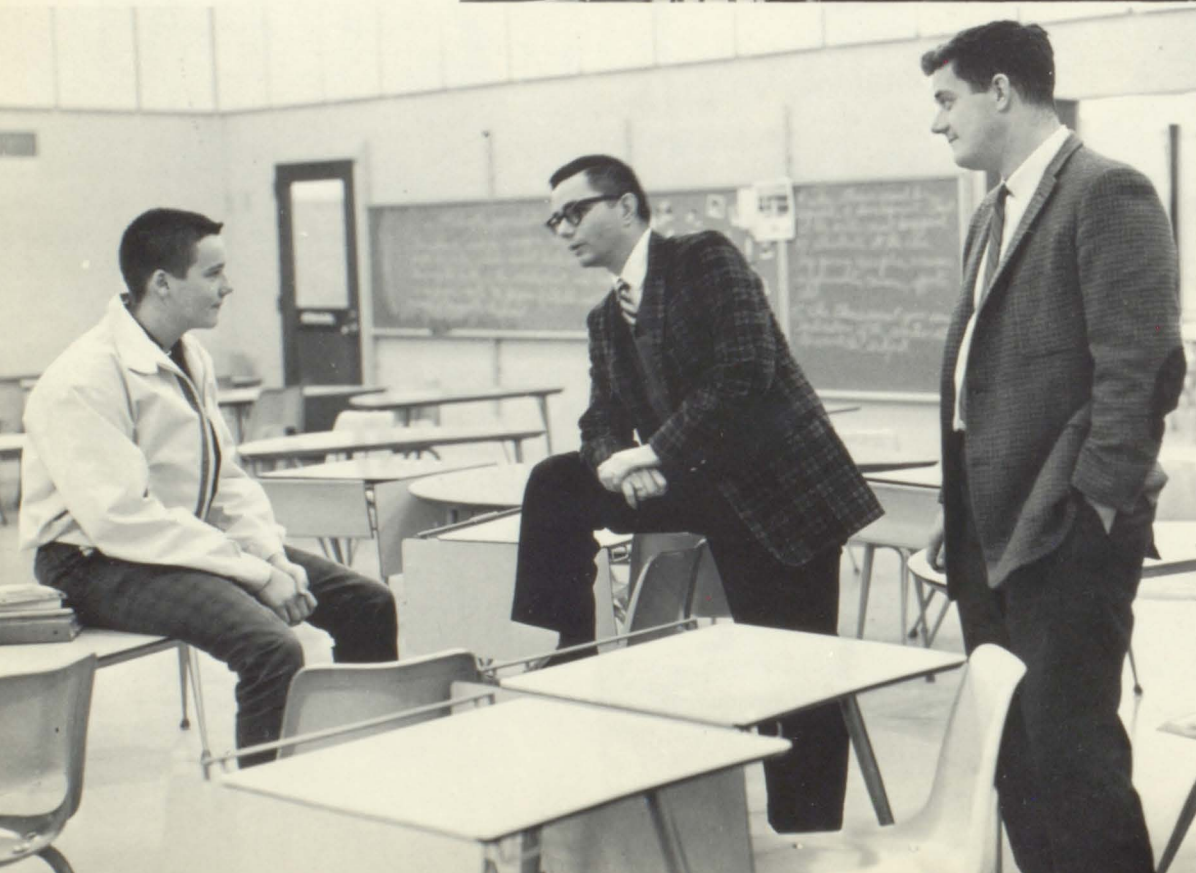
Mr. Foley--Band Director
