
A Day in the Life of Chagrin Falls High School























The Curious Savage













Once the students accepted





Foreign Language

In April of 1990, Dr. Gerhardt chaperoned a long trip to Germany. Seventeen Chagrin Falls students, five Brooklyn students, and Dr.Gerhardt's family traveled to West Berlin, Nuremberg, Munich, Salzburg, and Vienna. The students went sightseeing everywhere as a group with the exception of a few free afternoons. Even though most of the students were friends, after two and a half weeks of travel, they were like one big family. The experiences they shared while learning about Germany and the German culture, would never be forgotten.

The trip to France in April 1990, was supervised by Mr. Pepper and Mrs. Alt. Altogether, there were 33 French students who travelled to France, Monaco, Italy, and Switzerland. Each day was filled with tours, although free time was also allowed which gave the students freedom to explore on their own. According to Mr. Pepper, their excursion to France was "education on a broad scale". The students not only learned more about the French language and culture but also grew closer to their peers and teachers.

In the spring of 1991, Mrs. Hanson chaperoned about eighteen students on a trip to Spain and Portugal. In Spain, the students stayed in Madrid, Toledo, and Salamanca where they stayed with a Spanish family. Other cities the students visited were Villa Formosa, Cordoba, and Sevilla.











 In the last frame, Mike Robertson verbally commands his ball to veer more to the left as he needs a strike to win the game.
















Swimming
