



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


Bridging the Gap




of North Central Evaluation, and a year when the administration implemented and defended new school policy changes.

the girl to find the perfect mate, but it's still big enough for a chance at romance.






Spirit: We've Got It. So Let's Hear It!







Fall's Footlighters present Rebel Without a Cause






A Bloody Good Day






During the fall sports season this change in competitiveness began to show through and Chagrin emerged as a CVC power. We all witnessed



Gridders Rebound to .500 Season

Within one year the Tiger gridders brought their dismal record of three wins and seven losses up to a respectable 5-5 mark with three of their losses being by a touchdown or less. The team was lead by a solid nucleus of seniors, several of whom were returning to the varsity team for their third year, along with a core of extremly capable juniors and sophomores. Defense proved to be the key to the team's success, holding their opponents to very few points in an outstanding Chagrin Valley Conference. Senior safety Mike Chess led the county with a team high 6 interceptions as the Tiger defense posted an outstanding plus fifteen turnover ratio and outscored their

opponents by 54 points in their first three games. However, plagued by a number of injuries, the team's offense was inconsistent from there on. Their final record of five wins and five losses earned respect for the Tigers at a time when Chagrin must face opponents up to two and one-half times their size.

Girl's Soccer Makes Strong Showing:11-1-4



Girls Cross Country 1991 State Champions

Back On Top

In 1971 Chagrin Falls earned its first state championship. Now, twenty years later, that achievement has been duplicated. The 1991 girls cross country team led by four first team All-CVC selections is undoubtedly the greatest girls team ever assembled in Chagrin Falls history. They did not mearly win the Division II State Crown; they completely dominated the field in coasting to an easy thirty point margin of victory. Coach Olah was quoted as saying,"We were confident coming in." This confidence was due to the experience of senior standouts Elizabeth Hopkins and Amy Michel, Junior, All-Ohio selection Courtney Michel, and the emergence of freshman Courtney DeGross. Also, Don't count on the tigers being any weaker next season even though they lose two runners to graduation. 





The Tradition Lives On














- 1. Sophomore Grant Varnum attempts to score a reversal on his opponent during Chagrin's bout versus West Geauga.



Though the girls practiced long and hard and had a pool full of talent, their record does not!




this year providing for one of the most memorable years at the high school.


Juniors

These might be a couple of answers to that grueling question, "What is sophomore year really about?"




At the conclusion of the freshman year, the hundreds of new faces turn into hundreds of familiar faces, and the mile long hallways no longer seem so long.





Okay, maybe I am overstating it some-



Biology Classes Go Streamside


Students searched eagerly through the murky waters at Squaw Rock. Their purpose, to find and examine the creatures which dwell in the river. 




Teaching Life



Physical Education

The longtime tradition of taking upperclassmen bowling during gym periods is no longer in effect, due to the closing of Colonial Lanes and a new policy adapted by the administration in regard to athletes and gym. 




A case in point is the number of students involved in activities that are really concerned with their peers, their community, and their environment. Four clubs in the high school this past year immediately come to mind: SADD, TI, Peer Care, and Key Club.

SADD is a nationwide organization of Students

Against Driving Drunk. The mayhem and carnage on the nation's highways have given rise to a dedicated organization whose intention is not only for the members to not drink and drive (each is required to sign a contract to that effect), but whose members will not allow anyone else to drive drunk. This past year the group created a mock-accident to represent the results of drinking and driving. Has the organization been successful? Certainly to its members who have had the courage to go on record for something they believe in, and certainly to the millions of people who hear their simple, but lifesaving message.

Another school organization that also is concerned with the

The group is involved with inservice projects such as speaking at the middle and elementary school, and going on retreats. They also assist the Just Say 'No' club. TI is a group of very concerned peers.

Peer Care is yet another club that deals with student well-being. The club was reinstated this year after a period of inactivity. Peer care has twenty-eight members who have been on retreats, inservice meetings, and special workshops. One of these meetings included an "aquaintance rape" speaker in January. There are also smaller groups broken from the larger clan. These groups work

together to cover the issues with a smaller number of people. Peer Care representative, Mrs. Materni, says that this makes it easier for the students to speak out and bond, instead of speaking to twenty-eight people at a time. Peer Care obviously fills a real need in a society of increased perplexity.

Key Club fills the void that the other clubs don't deal with. Key Club's central objective is promoting volunteerism. Its outreach is to the

> surrounding community and the environment. One new project of Key Club this year has been the recycling efforts. Those large orange containers in all of the rooms in the school for the purpose of aluminum and paper recycling were placed there through the efforts of Key Club. The organization is also responsible for the infamous "Kiss the Pig Contest", where students (for a small fee) got to pick their "favorite" teacher whom they most liked to see kiss the pig in front of the entire student body, (breath mints anyone?). Money raised from the project went to the Cleveland Free Clinic.

Who says students aren't involved and aware? With dedicated and committed students in organizations such as these, we can only hope that the bridge to the future looks a little brighter, and the old teenage myth is, in part, dispelled.



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
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
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
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
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


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


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Closing It Out


