## Gridders Rebound to . 500 Season

Within one year the Tiger gridders brought their dismal record of three wins and seven losses up to a respectable 5-5 mark with three of their losses being by a touchdown or less. The team was lead by a solid nucleus of seniors, several of whom were returning to the varsity team for their third year, along with a core of extremly capable juniors and sophomores. Defense proved to be the key to the team's success, holding their opponents to very few points in an outstanding Chagrin Valley Conference. Senior safety Mike Chess led the county with a team high 6 interceptions as the Tiger defense posted an outstanding plus fifteen turnover ratio and outscored their
opponents by 54 points in their first three games. However, plagued by a number of injuries, the team's offense was inconsistent from there on. Their final record of five wins and five losses earned respect for the Tigers at a time when Chagrin must face opponents up to two and one-half times their size.

They did not mearly win the Division II State Crown; they completely dominated the field in coasting to an easy thirty point margin of victory. Peer Care obviously fills a real need in a society of increased perplexity.

Key Club fills the void that the other clubs don't deal with. Key Club's central objective is promoting volunteerism. Its outreach is to the surrounding community and the environment. One new project of Key Club this year has been the recycling efforts. Those large orange containers in all of thie rooms in the school for the purpose of aluminum and paper recycling were placed there through the efforts of Key Club. The organization is also responsible for the infamous "Kiss the Pig Contest", where students (for a small fee) got to pick their "favorite" teacher whom they most liked to see kiss the pig in front of the entire student body, (breath mints anyone?). Money raised from the project went to the Cleveland Free Clinic.

Who says students aren't involved and aware?
