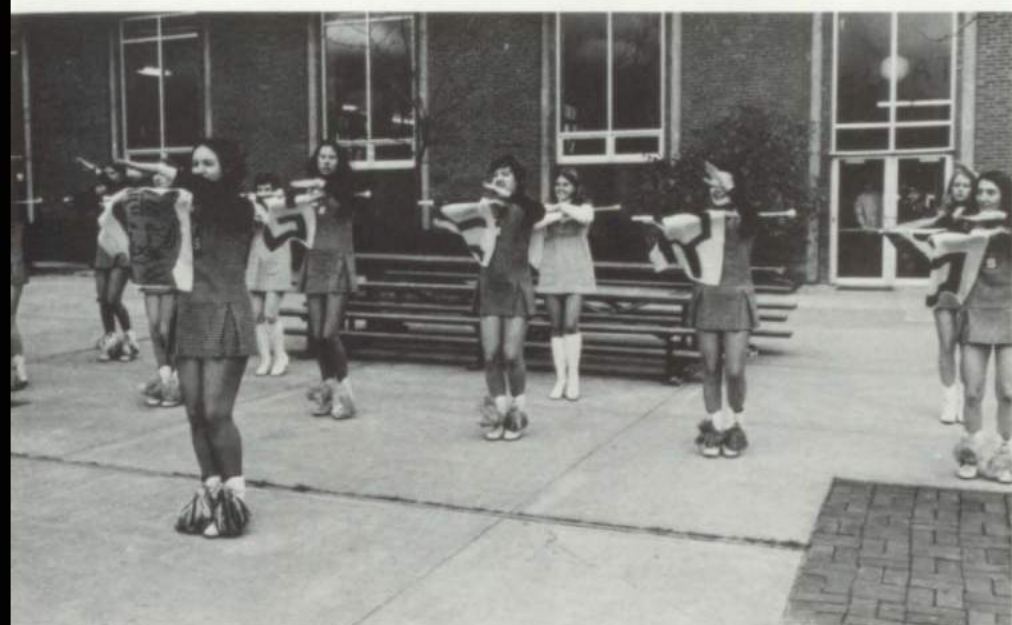
Pom-poms, Majorettes, and Flaggies add color to games

NHS inducts eleven new members this fall

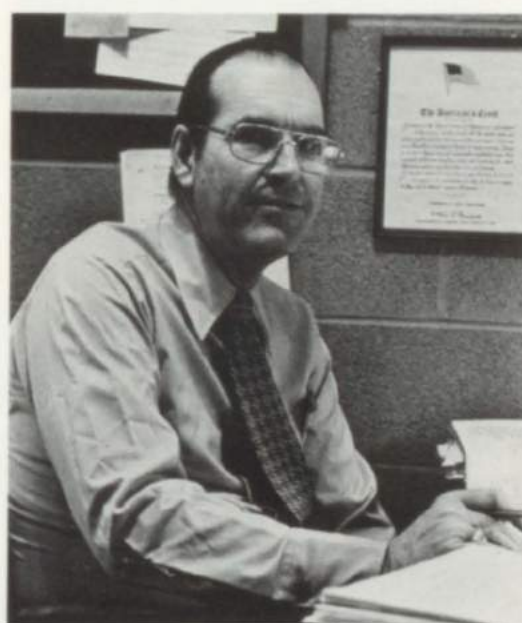

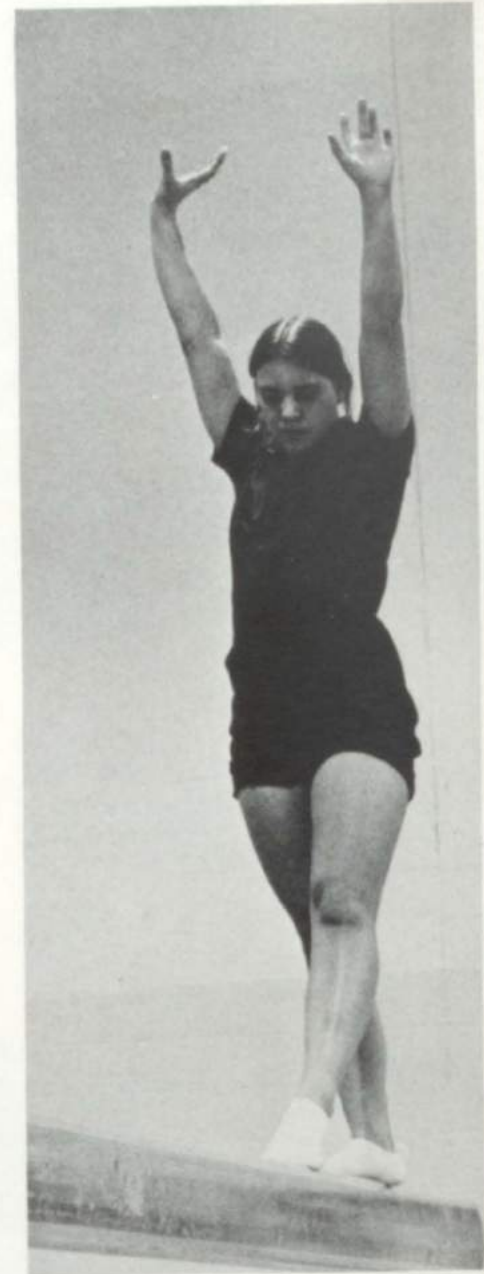
Girls' organizations provide competition and excitement

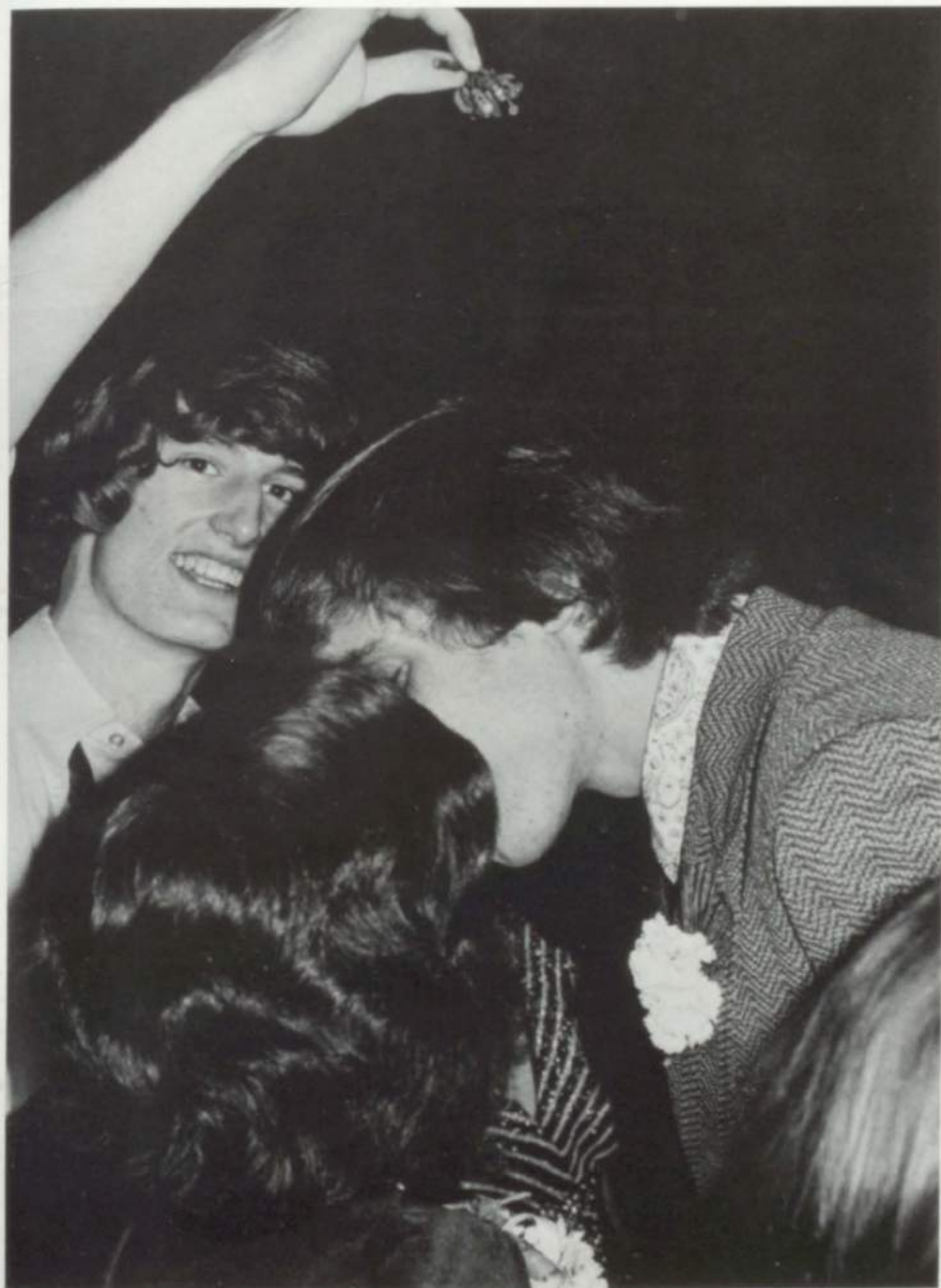

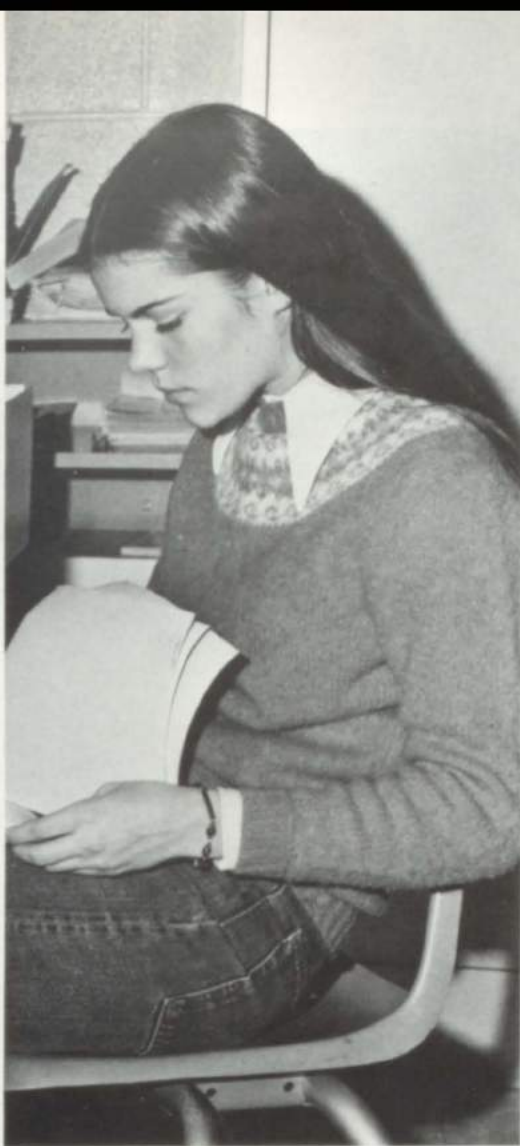

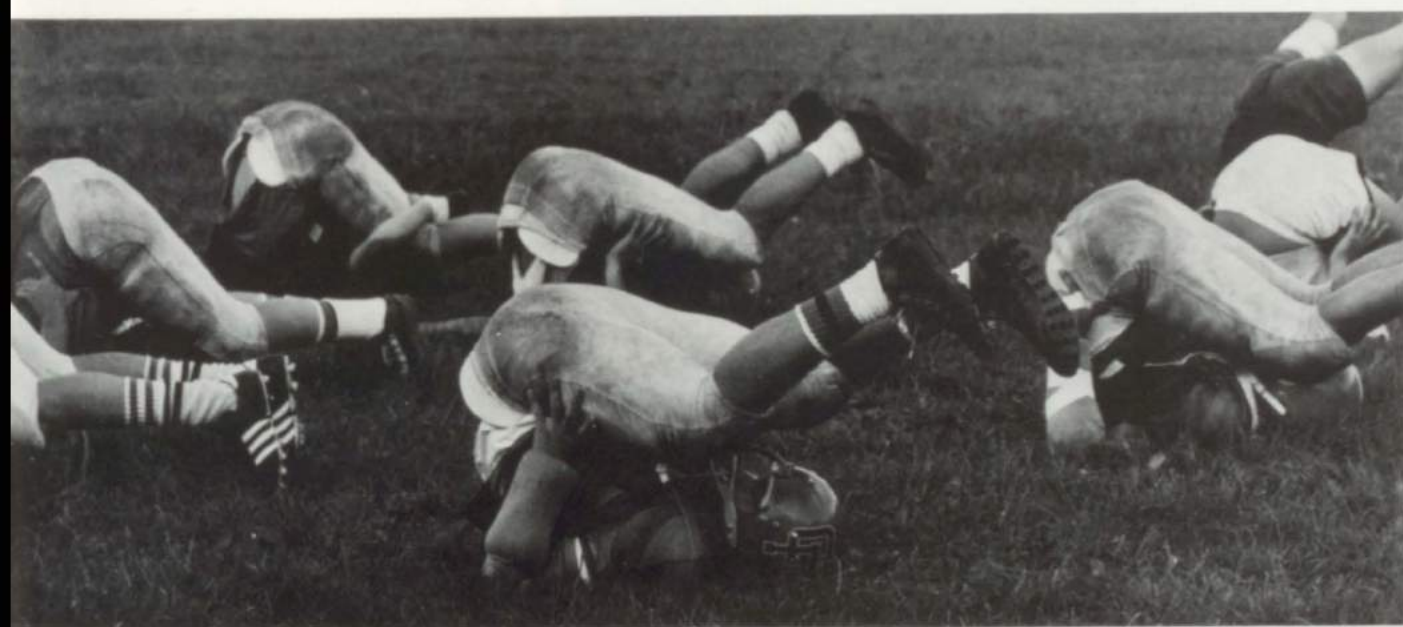

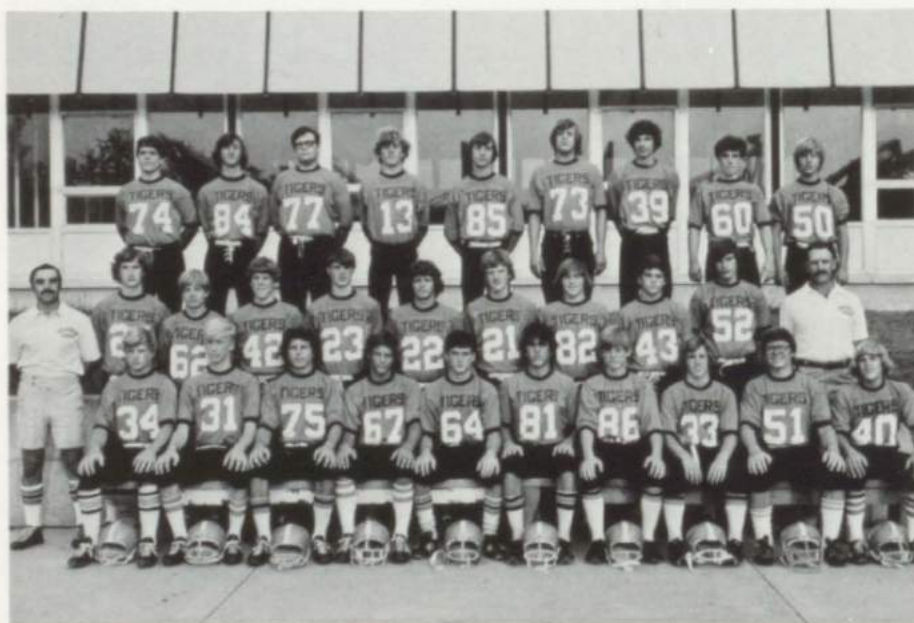

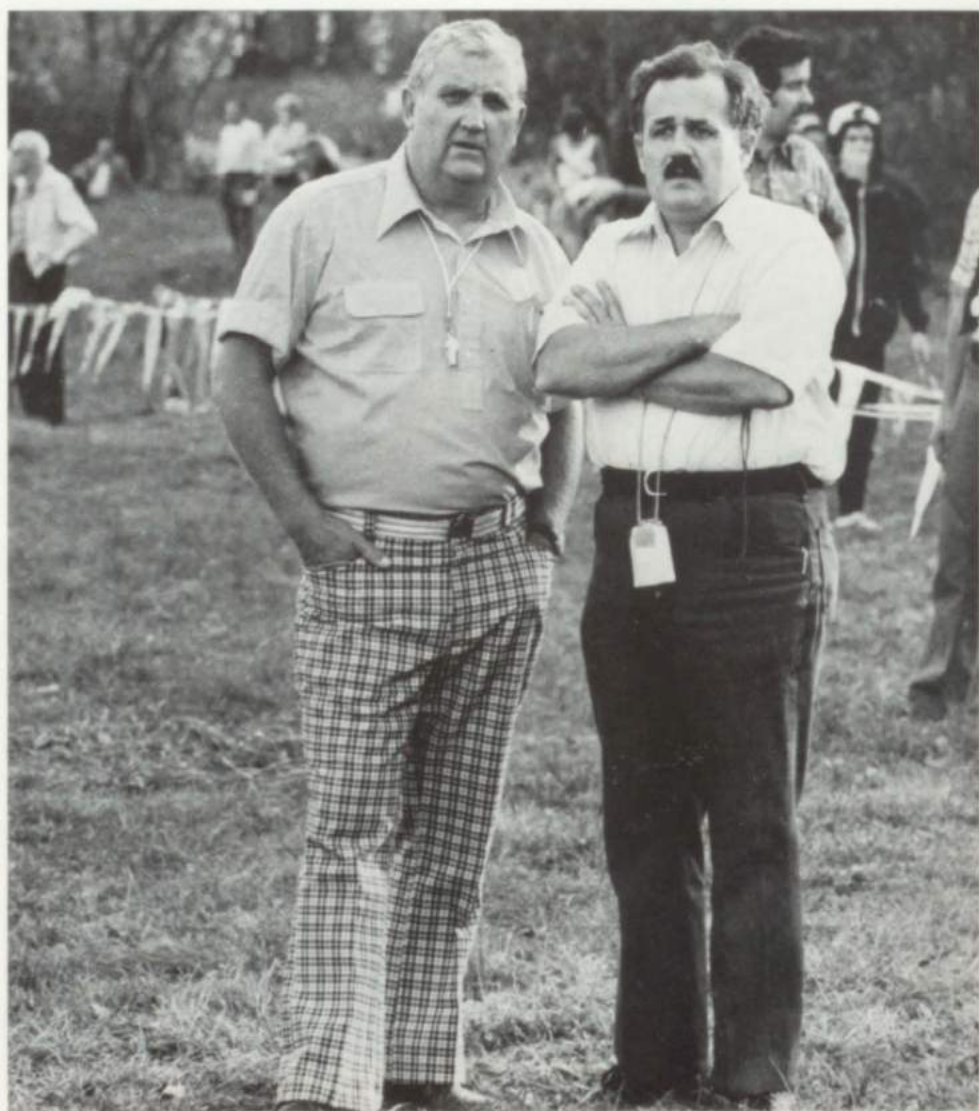
Promising J.V. and Frosh show potential

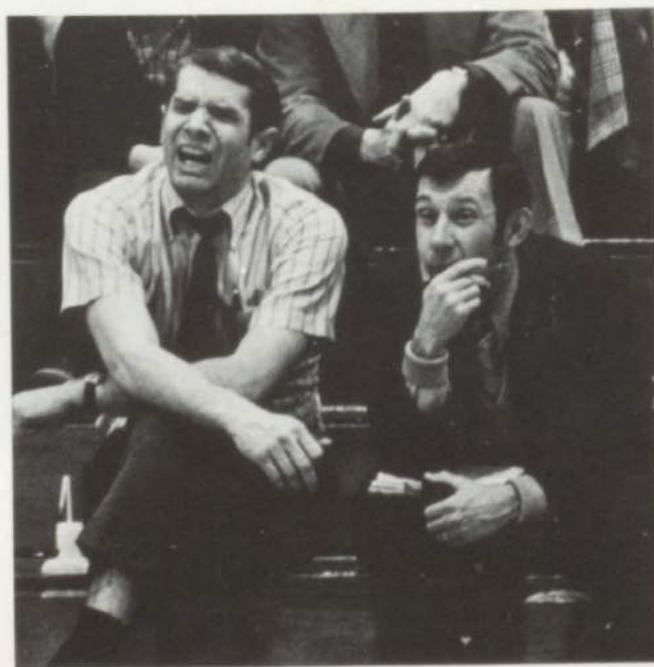
Tigers come out 'runnin' and gunnin' ''

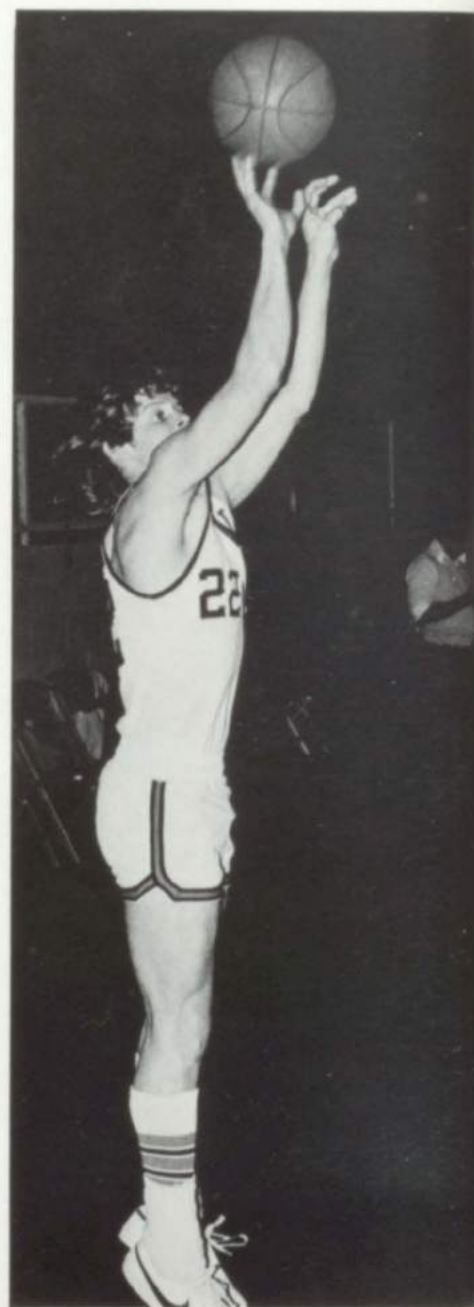
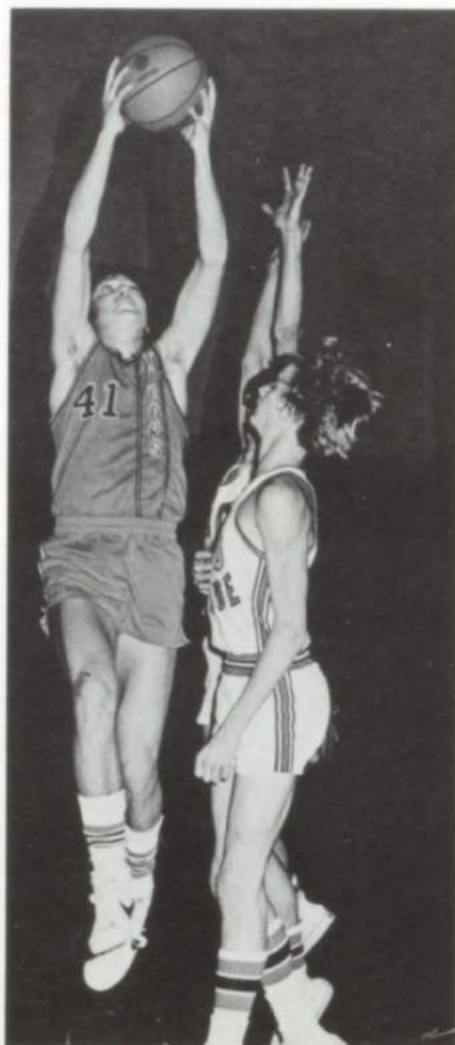

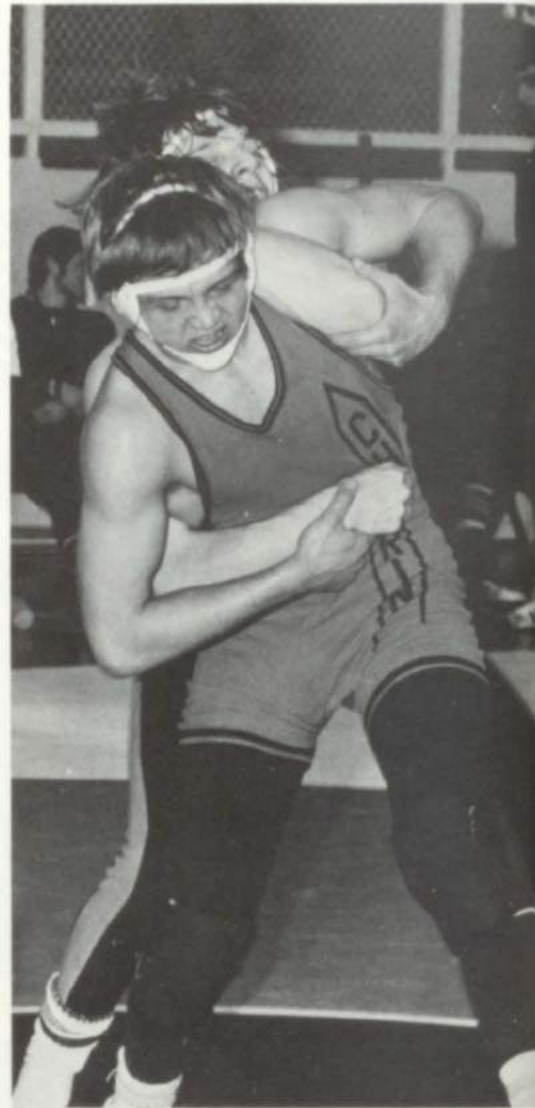


It was worth it

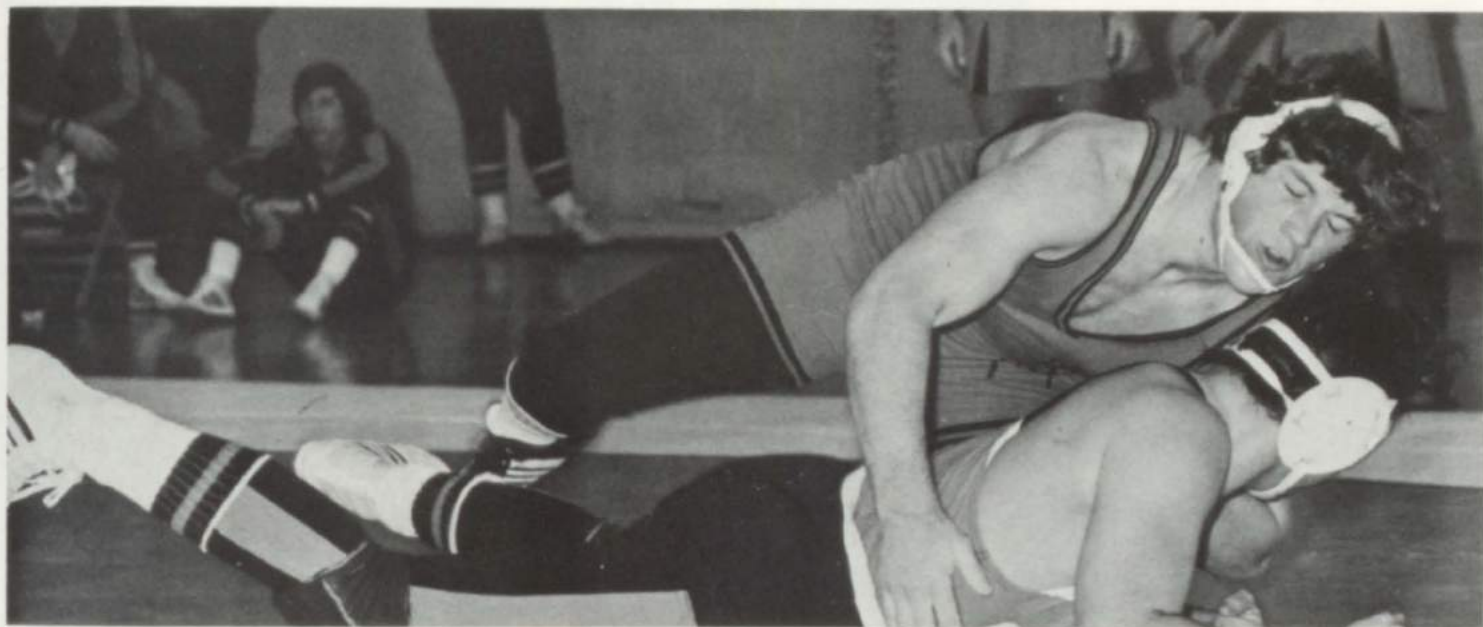
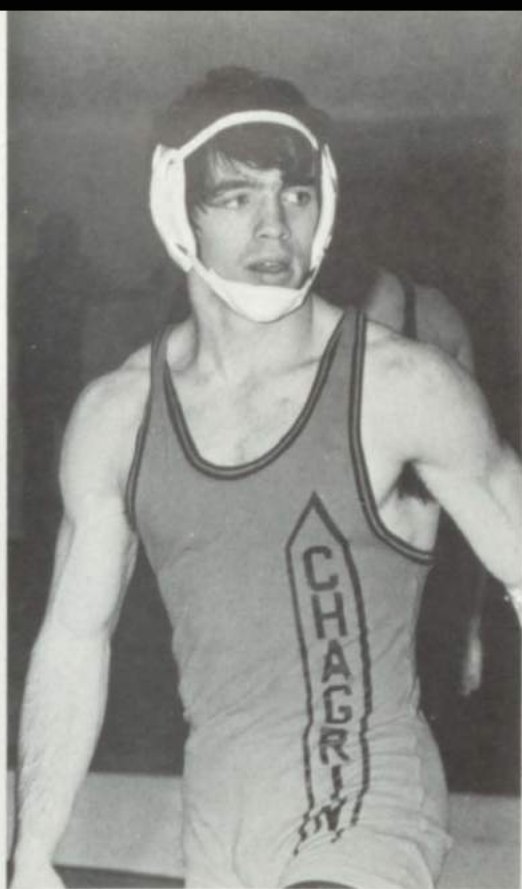
and contributed to a team effort.

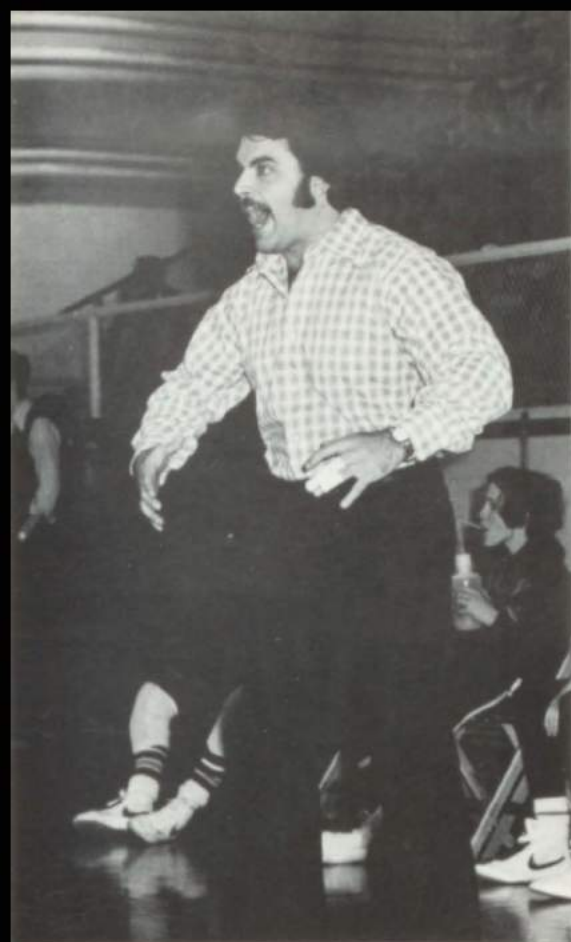

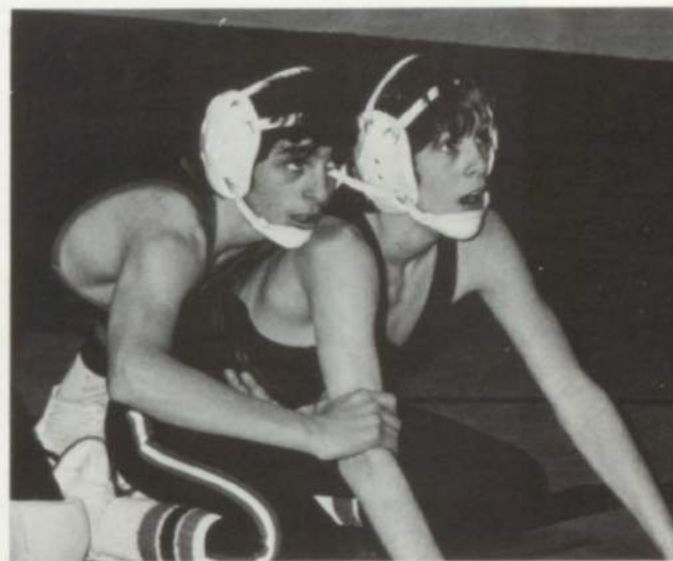

Trackmen give top effort despite rain and snow



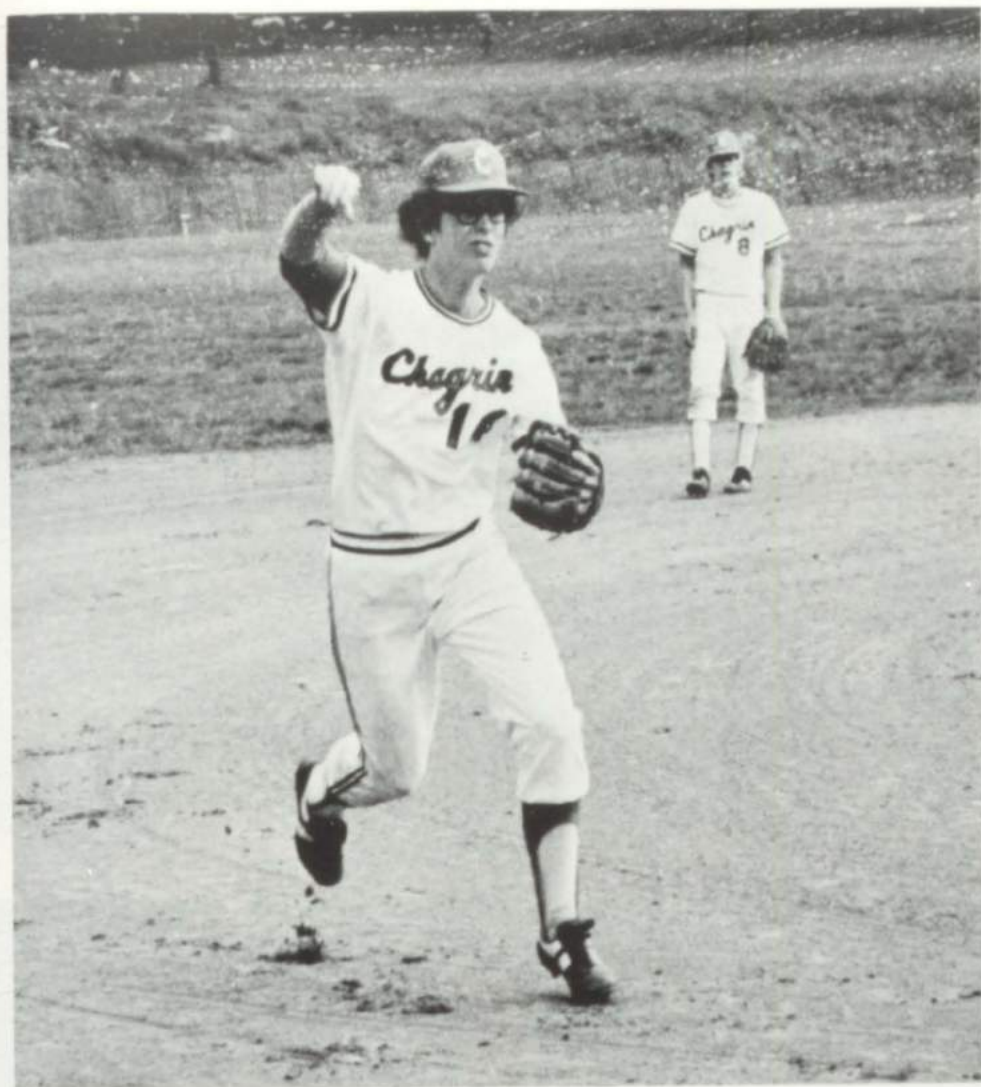

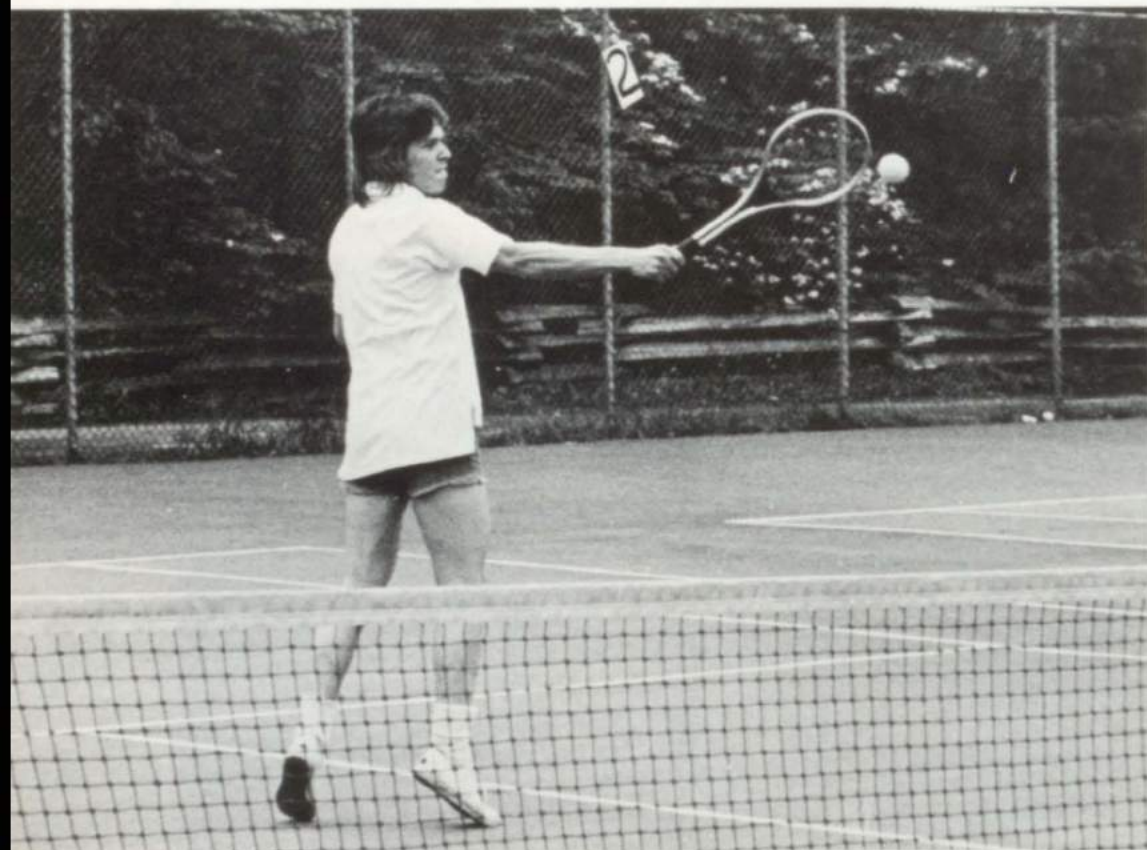
Cold and wet weather hinders spring baseball

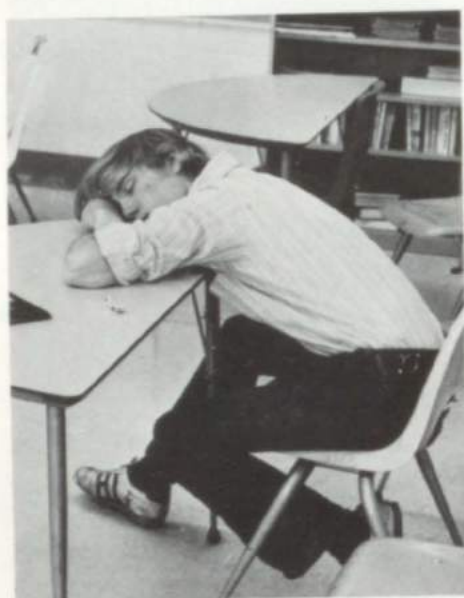

Students enriched by progressive courses

Major curriculum changes have been initiated in the English Department during the past two years. In an effort to provide courses suited to the needs and interests of all students, the English Department expanded its course offerings and eliminated the traditional year-long Sophomore English and Junior English classes. Students are currently required to take English 9 and Basic Composition. After they have met these requirements, students may elect their English courses from a wide variety of nine-week and semester courses which are open to Sophomores, Juniors and Seniors.

New courses this year are Creative Problem Solving, Contemporary Poetry and Song Lyrics, Drama II, Literature of the Minorities, and Sports and Writers. Creative Problem Solving, a unique approach to self-analysis and to logic, focuses on the discussion of problems, situations and solutions. Students taking Contemporary Poetry and Song Lyrics analyze and write poems and song lyrics. Drama II, an advanced course in theatre, re-enforces the techniques and abilities gained in Drama I.

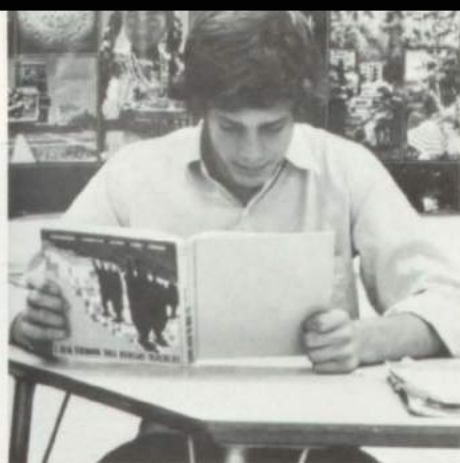
Students who do not take nine-week courses may choose a semester course such as American Literature, English Literature, or Modern Literature. Seniors may elect to take Advanced Placement English, a year-long, college-level course which prepares them for the A.P. test in May. Seniors taking this test may receive college placement and/or credit.

Next year an intermediate composition course and Journalism will be added to the already varied curriculum. We can look forward to continued changes in the courses offered by the English Department.

Individual- ized study and trips abroad highlight Foreign Languages

The knowledge of a foreign language is a valuable asset. With it, it is possible to communicate with people from other countries and to learn about the art, literature and customs of these nations.

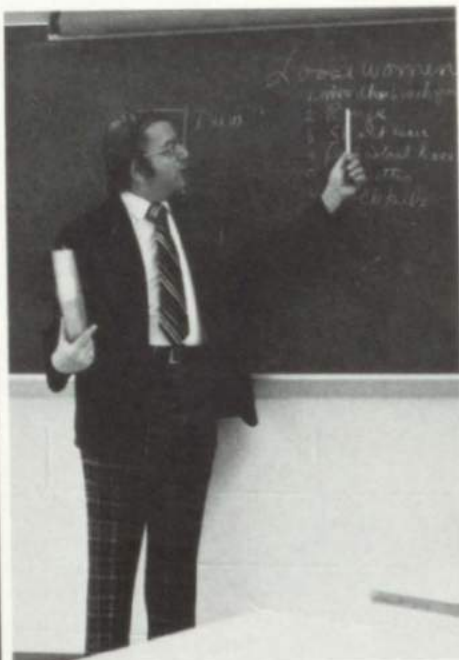
New insights in social studies arouse student interest

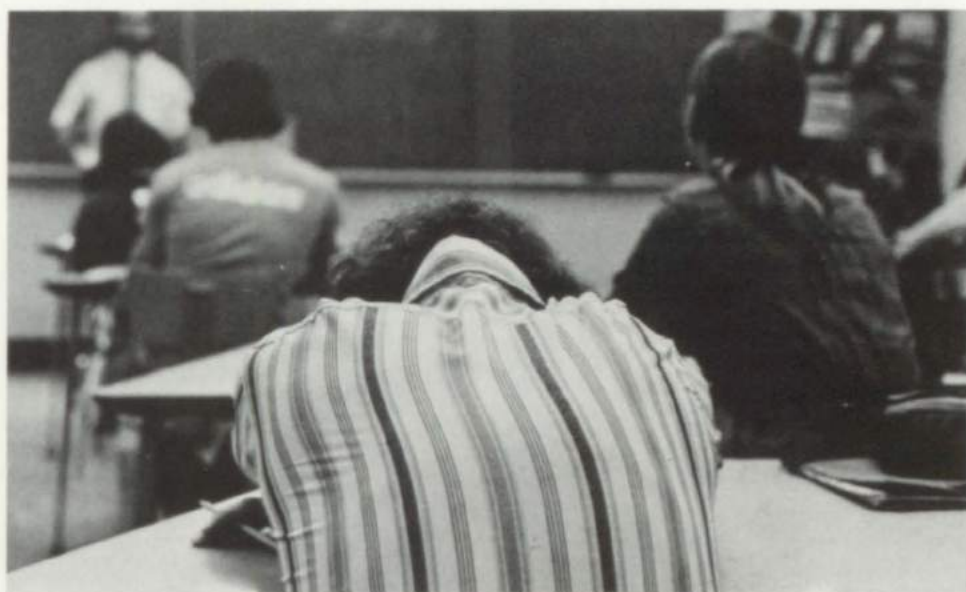
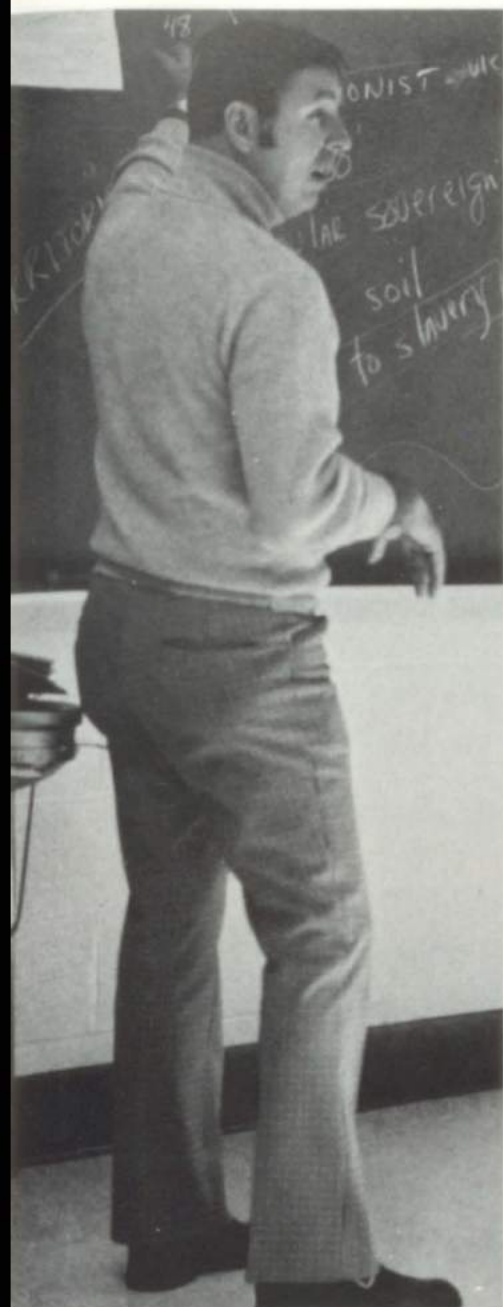

Meet the new addition

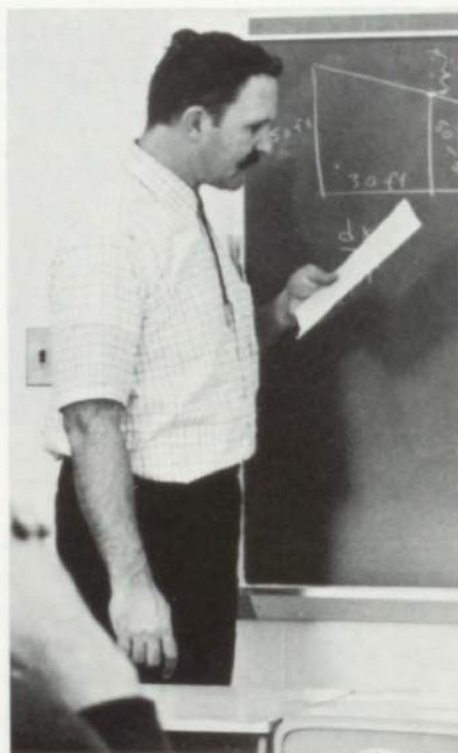
The newest addition to the Mathematics department is "our friendly calculator."

The calculator resides in room 223, Mr.

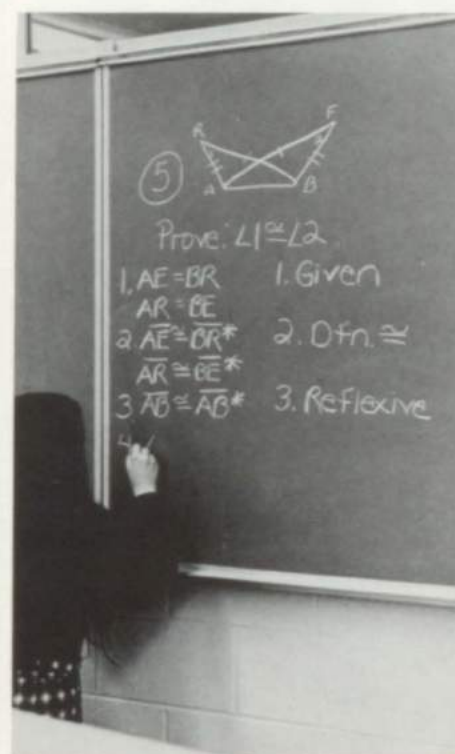
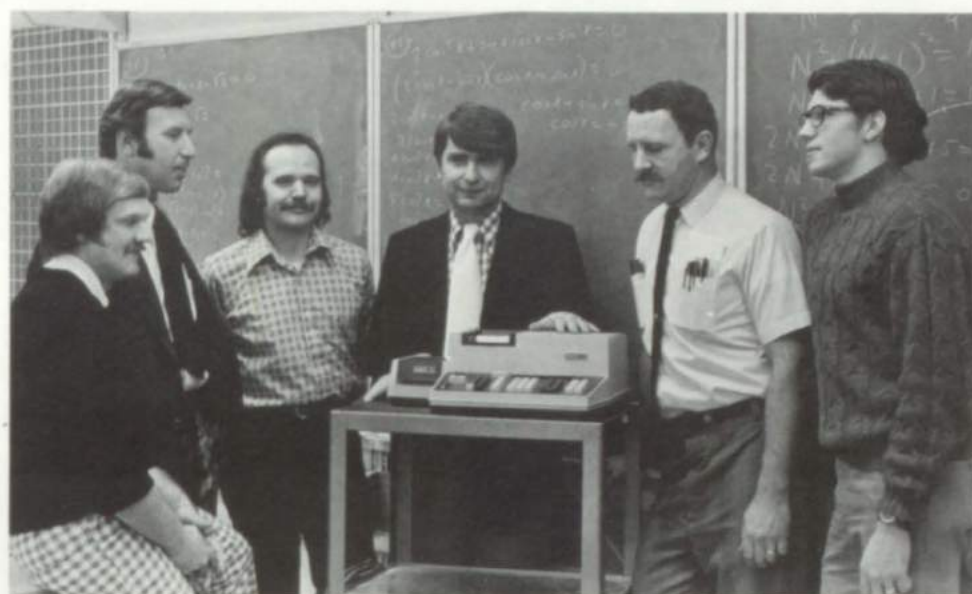
Ohlrich's room, but is shared and passed around by all the math classes.

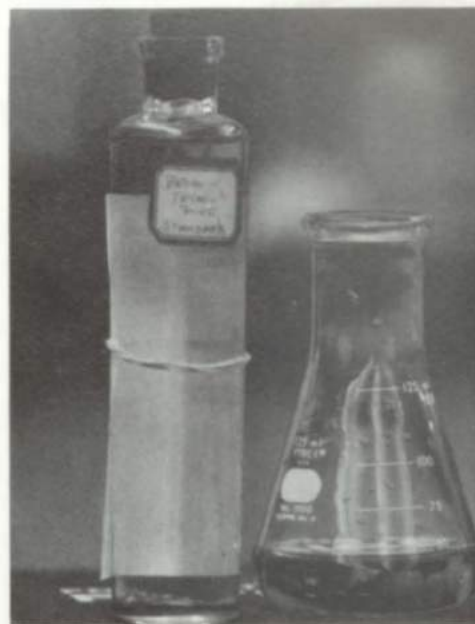
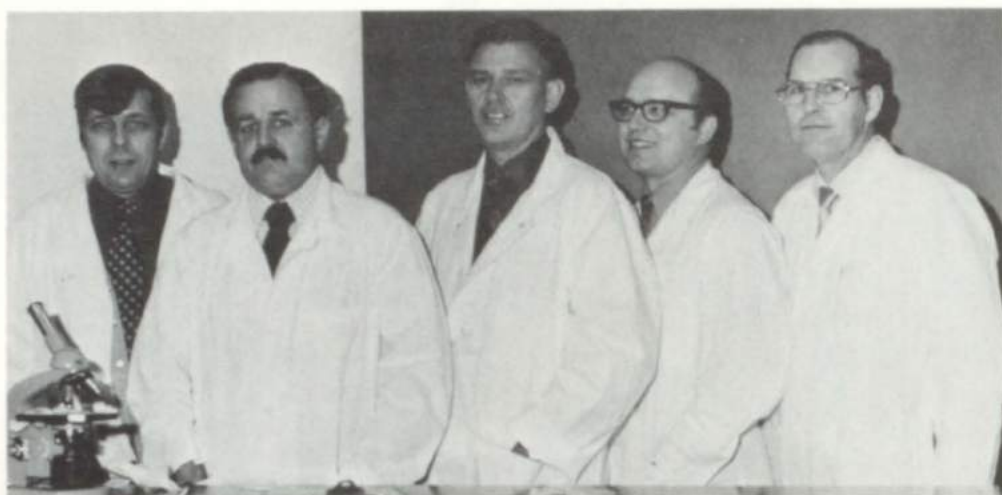

Through exploration, experimentation, and evaluation, the science student learns to arrive at conclusions about the world around him. By taking a rational and factual approach to a new idea or theory, he learns to study, to probe, and finally to understand it.

The Science Department, through a demanding curriculum, teaches each student to be more precise, more thorough, more inquisitive and more attentive. It is important to be precise and thorough in assignments, and careful attention must be paid in class to the difficult and often intricate concepts that are presented.

The Science Department contains the facilities for student learning and exploration. There are labs with scientific equipment and opportunities for field trips and nature walks. Perhaps the most valuable resource in the science department is the teacher. By acting not only as a teacher, but also as a guide, he lays the groundwork of basic knowledge and guides the student toward making his own conclusions.

Essence of fine arts is based upon students' expression

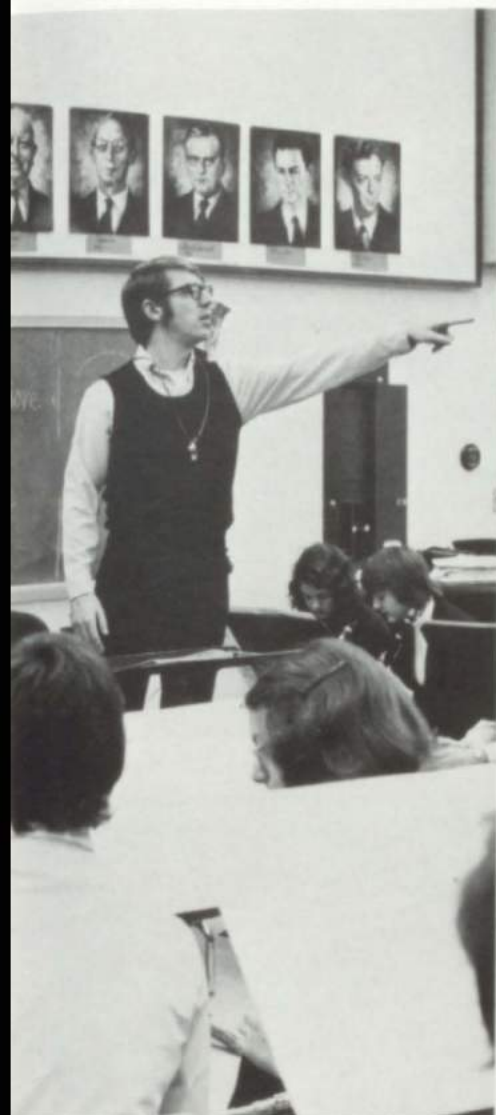

Practical skills prepare students for the future

Academic subjects cover only one part of a student's total education. Also important is education's practical side. Home economics, business, industrial arts and vocational classes teach the practical skills necessary for life in the world of work.

With two home economics instructors this year, it is now possible to offer more courses in the arts of homemaking, serving, tailoring, cooking, and interior design.

In business education, there are many courses to choose from. Students may elect typing, accounting, shorthand, or business machines.

These courses give a student the skills he needs to get a job after or during his high school years.

In vocational education, students in O.W.E. go to school for a half a day and work in a job outside of school during the other half. Students in D.C.T. are in their own school for part of the day, while for the other half they travel to schools in cooperation with Chagrin to take such courses as Cosmetology, Child Care, and Vocational Drafting. These classes and work experiences help to prepare a student for a field of work upon graduation from high school.

Students taking industrial arts work on various shop projects, starting with required ones during the first year, and then working independently on projects of their own choice.

The Industrial Arts Department, besides wood and metal work, also offers Architectural and Engineering Drawing and Drafting.

By teaching students practical skills while still in high school, home economics, business, industrial arts and vocational classes play an important part in preparing them for the outside world.

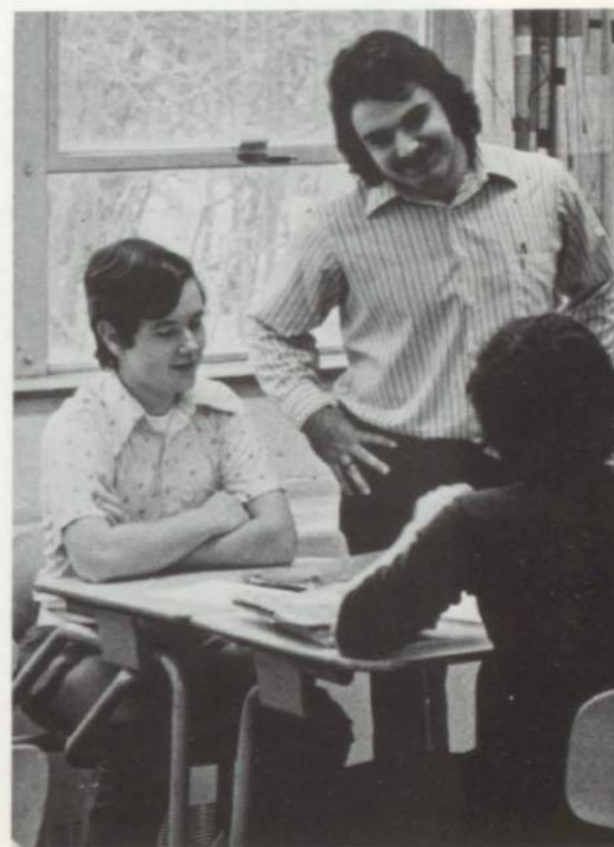

Breakfast bar serves 50 each morning

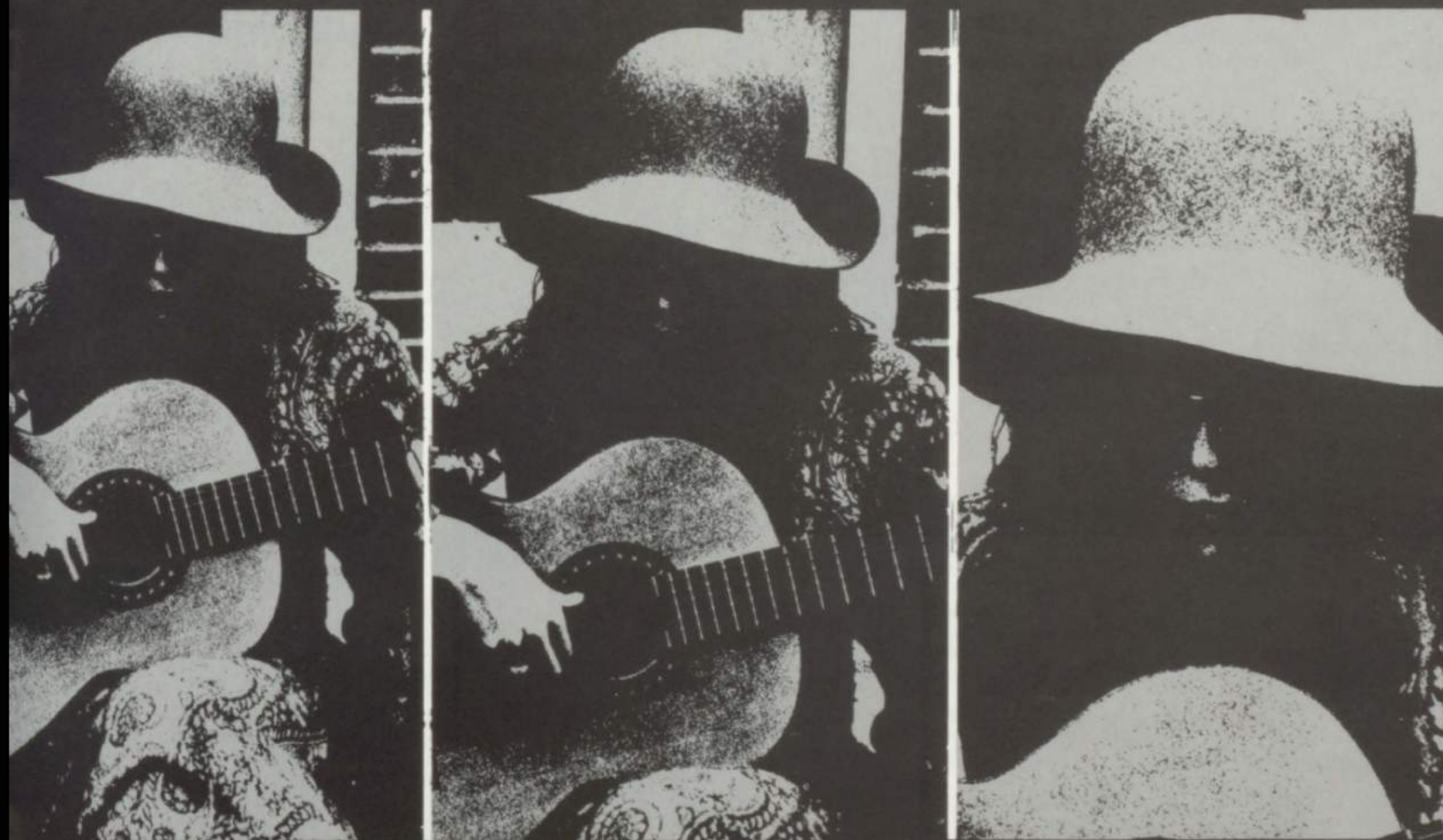

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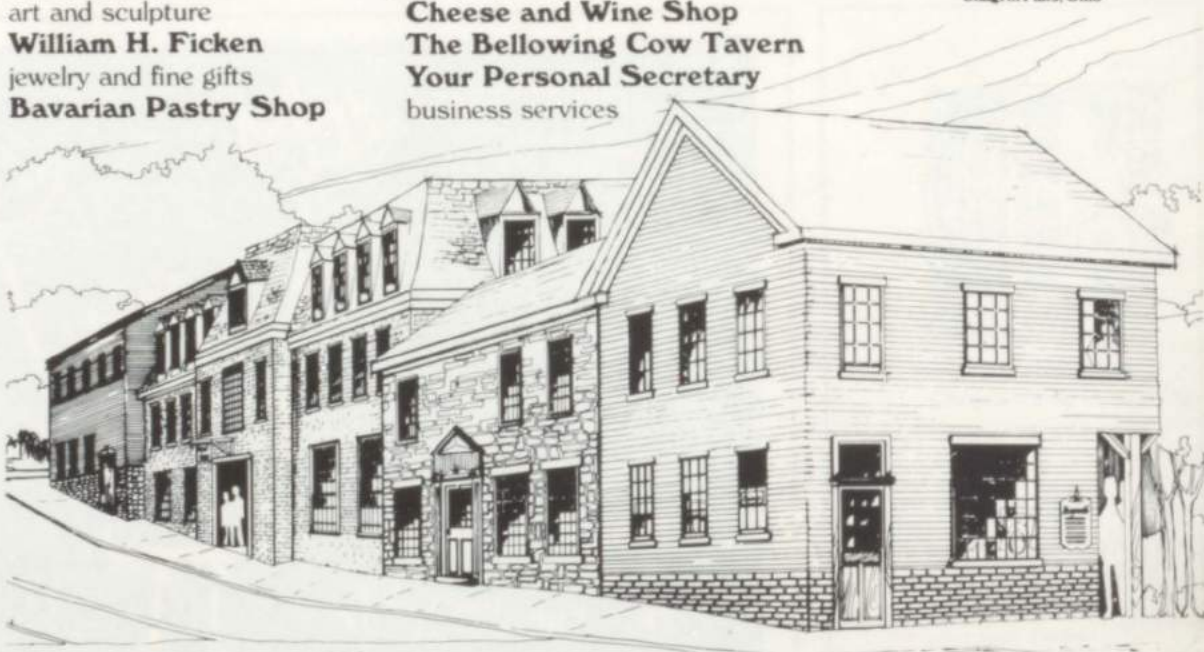
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
