













Although small in number, the noble Romans enjoy lavish banquets, sports activities, and competitions with the other language clubs.




Hours of practice and performing in freezing temperatures were just minor obstacles for these girls. The dance team and the majorettes were advised by Mrs. Jane Battles.





In October, the Student Council members had a workshop at Punderson State Park. There, they listened to various speakers and developed new ideas for the school year.



The Chagrin Falls High School Music and Drama Departments, presented "Music Man," by Meredith Wilson, on March 24-27 as their 1977 spring musical.



The director was Harold Loesch, the choral director was Mollie Macknin, the choreographer was Karen Haus, and student director was Jean Long.













### Mini-Courses































Politics is the art of meeting people's expectations. In 1976 two hundred years of trying to fulfill the American people's expectations culminated in one of the closest, and most unique, presidential elections. A new conservatism moved across the land, inspired by the political legacy of Watergate and government's soaring cost. For the first time, in the popular sense, responsibility in government became the fundamental issue. From the dusty fields of rural Georgia came the Democratic challenger, Jimmy Carter, to unseat the Republican caretaker, Gerald Ford, who was struggling to maintain the last vestiges of Republican credibility. In a long and dull campaign morality was the central issue, ranging from Carter's Playboy magazine fantasies to Gerald Ford's sloughing on international human rights. Surprisingly large numbers of voters turned out in the wake of the nit-picking televised candidate debates to express desires for more jobs, less inflation, better government, and Jimmy Carter, not all of which go together.




#### Mathematics



Occupational Work Experience (OWE) and Diversified Cooperative Training (DCT) are both vocational Co-op programs whose major thrust is to give a student the basic knowledge he needs to develop attitudes and skills necessary to be successful in the world of work. The requirements for OWE are that a student be 16 years of age and be motivated to work. The jobs which the students perform are not usually of a skilled nature. DCT students must be seniors and seeking a skilled trade in one of the following areas: Transportation, Building trades, Service Industry, or Manufacturing. On the job, students received close supervision from a skilled person already an expert in their field. In the classroom, the students become involved with studying technical information related to their occupation through a self study program. A portion of their school day is used to meet other academic requirements for graduation.

DCT/OWE is instructed by Mr. Pete Olah, Mr. Fred Girard and Mr. Jack Glaser. They not only coordinate job experience, but often help students with different problems at school.







#### Home Ec. & Business


